St. Anthony's Credit Union Meeting

The annual meeting of St. Anthony's Credit Union Ltd. was held in the parish hall on Oct. 20. A well attended meeting and visitors were present. The meeting opened with films, and later the business meeting was called to order. The report of the directors was read by the president, Dorice Gallant, who gave the activities of the Credit Union during the past year. He stated that regular meetings were held, a number of special meetings. The annual banquet of the officers which was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Gaudet was successful. He expressed his regrets at the loss the Credit Union sustained by the passing of three members. Mr. Gallant felt that there was great need for an educational program; he said that more films, and social evenings will be the agenda of the officers' meeting.

Let's Talk It Over

A disappointing year, such as this one has been, in the potato market gives one an insight into at least one of the things it takes to be a successful farmer. Dogged persistence in the face of discouragement is definitely one of the requirements. Even for those farmers who are comfortably situated, a year bringing the usual share of strenuous labor with little monetary return must present a formidable challenge to a farmer's will to persevere. Under such circumstances it is understandable that the farmer is sometimes out of sympathy with the struggle of the day-wage earner to better his lot. At least these laborers are sure of a definite rate of remuneration for their work. No one expects them to work all summer and have their pay checks depend on such a mercurial factor as the law of supply and demand.

On the other hand, it must be conceded that the farmer has some very definite advantage over the daily wage earner. His daily toil should be much more interesting because he is working for himself. The spectre of unemployment never haunts him. Hard times can deprive him of many of life's luxuries, but rarely take away the bare necessities. It is probably true that he works harder for a dollar than the day laborer does, but toil loses much of its drudgery when the heart is in union with the muscles. The farmer, who is never very vocal in stating his grievances, is overdue for a new deal, however, as most of the things he must buy are up. Let us hope he never decides to go on strike to bring redress for his wrongs. It would certainly be a "hunger" strike for a lot of us if he did.

Minister Inducted At New London

Rev. William Eric Ingraham was inducted into the Parish of New London by Ven. Archbishop G. R. Harrison of Summerside and St. Eleanor, under the mandate of the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, at St. Mark's Church, Kensington, on Nov. 7.

The service opened with the hymn "O Thou Who Makest Souls to Shine", followed by Evensong, conducted by the Rev. G. R. F. Ebsary of the parishes of Crapaud and Springfield.

The New Testament lesson was read by Rev. K. E. L. Cushion of Port Hill and Inverness. Archdeacon Harrison spoke briefly then read the Mandate of the Bishop, followed by prayers and responses. The induction of the rector as incumbent of the parish by the Archbishop was followed by the presentation of the keys of the parish by Mr. Gordon Cooke, Parish Warden. "We Love the Place, O God", was sung.

The charge to the rector was given by Canon J. T. Robb of St. Paul's, Charlottetown, and Rev. J. R. MacMahon, Alberton, Rural Dean, followed by "Lord Pour Thy Spirit From on High." Rev. Canon G. E. Moffatt of St. Peter's, Charlottetown, delivered the address, taking for his text, the words, "The Son of Man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give His life a ransom for many." The giving of self to the people, equally applicable to the minister and to the people. When a man becomes a deacon, he is dedicated to service, for the word itself means service, and no matter what office he may later hold, he is always a deacon. A minister as well as his people must be obedient to God and to those in authority. The Canon stressed the need of prayer and adoration, saying, "Thee, O Lord, our lives as Christians is the approach to God in adoration, prayer, offering, and self-sacrifice."

The Eucharist, or Holy Communion, he said, "must be the central act of all Christianity," the outward and visible expression of our faith. Live in union with God and "a fulness of life, joy and strength is ours." "Lord Speak to Me That I may speak" was sung following the sermon. The closing prayers and benediction by Ven. G. R. Harrison were followed by "Ye Servants of the Lord." A reception was held in the rectory immediately following the service when refreshments were served. Mr. Ingraham's mother, Mrs. D. Roy Ingraham, assisted by the women's organization, Rev. Mr. MacMahon expressed appreciation on behalf of those present and Rev. Mr. Ingraham responded.—Bur.

This machine is said to be able to work for a complete day on less than \$5.00 worth of fuel.—S.
