Sandy's Royals Need PCHL Tilts

The Royals didn't look too majestic as they skated off the ice after having absorbed an 11-4 lacing at the hands of the Moncton Hawks Wednesday evening, but in all fairness to the team they did not look that bad (in comparison to the Hawks) for 46 minutes of the game.

Alf Flanagan, Angie Carroll, and Dave Lawlor stood out for the Royals as did Stan Pearson for the two periods that he played. However Pearson displaced his thumb and was forced to leave the contest. Flanagan showed why he played in the Sen-C loop last season for when the chips were down he managed to come up with the big play. Nevertheless the whole team seemed to run out of steam in the third stanza after they had 'motted the score.

Defense caused the Royals some trouble, although the members of the blue line corps showed that they were not loath to come up with a bit of checking in the corners. It could be that a lack of games was the main reason for this discrepancy for several times both players would backskate almost to the goalmouth and neither one take the attacking forward.

The big thing that showed up with the lack of backchecking, and this too can be directly attributed to lack of games. Time and time again Moncton had breaks, two on one situations, or three on two and it was only the great work of Frizell in the Royals net that kept the scoreboard from reading 20. Frizell must have handled close to fifty drives and Wood and MacGonnell two of the more industrious Royals defencemen bluffed more than their share too.

It would seem to me that the Royals would greatly benefit from a series of matches with a couple of clubs from the Prince County Hockey League such as the Borden Nats and the Pope Motor Aces! As it stands right now the Royals have not yet reached any semblance of shape, and these matches would be good hard hitting contests. They would involve a lot less cost for the Royals to get in shape, for so far the club has travelled to the mainland once and will be going again Saturday. These PCHL clubs would provide the Royals with a good stiff workout.

JUNIOR RULING ANNOUNCED

The following is an excerpt from a directive that the Charlottetown and District Junior Hockey League Executive issued announcing the punishment imposed on three players for "serious infractions of the rules."

(a) Frank Robinson, Rogers Rangers, misconduct penalty, suspended for one game and to be severely reprimanded. Abuse of the referees will not be tolerated under any conditions and a much heavier sentence will be handed down if any player abuses the referees.

(b) John Irwin, Rogers Rangers, misconduct and match penalty for pushing the referee, is suspended from League play until January 1, 1966, and is to be severely reprimanded. In future, any player in the Junior League who attacks the referees in any way will automatically be out of hockey for the balance of the 1965-66 season.

(c) Wayne MacDougall, SDHS, misconduct and match misconduct, suspended from League play for next two games in which he participates in the Forum last night. No doubt there will be some discussion over these rulings but on the whole they are very fair and reasonable. Referees are on the ice to control the game and when players start to dispute every call that they make then something has to be done by league officials. In this case the executive has done something and let us hope that it has come in time.

Weeb Ewbank, coach of the highest-priced rookie of them all—Joe Namath—says the practice of giving big money to sign untried college football players has reached the point of foolishness. "It's silly, just silly, what these kids are asking and what they're getting," the coach of New York Jets stated. "Even the bonuses for the good ones are out of line. And all of them, all down the line, want at least \$20,000 or \$25,000 to sign." Sonny Werblin, owner of the Jets, went on a spending spree last year in signing rookies and reportedly laid out \$250,000 to land his No. 1 choice for this year—Jackie Bill Yearby of Michigan. Namath signed for a reported \$400,000 last year and is proving his value as the Jet quarterback with a solid chance at Rookie of the Year honors. Three other big-money Jets have played little or not at all this season—quarterback John Huarte, \$200,000; flanker Bob Schweickert, \$100,000, and fullback Cosmo Iacovazzi, \$100,000. Ewbank said that although bonuses were unrealistic, salaries on the Jets were "in line." "Namath is not the highest-paid player on this club," he added. "The highest bonus yes, but not the highest salary."

HUNTER'S CORNER

Duck And Goose Hunting Has Slowed To A Crawl

December is with us once again and winter is waiting just around the corner. The tempo of the duck and goose hunting has slowed to a crawl. For the past two weeks, or longer, the geese have taken refuge on salt water. Eelgrass and goose onions may be a far cry from plump grain kernels but they can at least dine in safety and quietude. The duck hunting petered out because there were no ducks worth the name to hunt. After the opening morning of opening blinds were out of the picture entirely and the big northern blacks were just a fleeting target at rare intervals. Experienced salt water gunners are convinced that the flight of northern red-legs this fall is down an approximate sixty per cent and that our own local blacks are tottering on the verge of non-existence.

The kill on wildgeese this season was almost fantastic. One party of goose hunters had bagged 78 wildgeese by November 3rd and topped the one hundred mark by the thirtieth. Another party, a twosome, had a score of 71 a week ago and may have had a final hunt since. One hunter, a loner, shot 28 before he hit hunting. Many are asking the question: "What motive prompted this senseless slaughter of our wild life?" Offhand I say it was to get something "brag" about and put themselves in the 'top goose hunters' class. This columnist stopped at an opening morning shoot. It is too much like taking candy from a child and one goose was needed for the table. I had the opportunity of going with my partner toward sea's close. The very thought of going out and crutching in a snow covered blind, while a bit nor'wester turned my blood the consistency of ice, gave 'goose pimples'. He hadn't a goose hunt for weeks and had a couple for two friends as well as one for his own. The dawn broke grey and the hours after day-break seemed like weeks. No

Rangers, PVI Tie 9-9; Whitlock Collects 6 Points

There was just a little too much of Bobby Whitlock for the Provincial Vocational Institute to handle as he led the Rogers Rangers from a four goal deficit with two third period markers, to a 9-9 tie, at the Charlottetown Forum last night. Whitlock had picked up two goals in the first and second periods to give him four for the night. He also had two assists. Alden Cameron was the top goal getter for PVI. He scored a hat-trick and had one assist. Both David Mitchell and Paul Stanley picked up two goals and one assist each for PVI.

The game started with PVI forcing the puck into the Rangers zone and after a brief struggle Wayne Hughes received a pass from the corner and backhanded it into the first stanza. The play in the first stanza continued as it had started, fast and wide open. The play shifted from end to end at a fast pace and it wasn't too often that the red light didn't blink before the puck left one zone or the other. There were seven goals scored in the first period. In one case two goals were only seconds apart.

PVI came out of the first stanza enjoying a slim one-goal margin but at the end of the second period they had increased this margin to three. This period proved to be a little rough on the Rangers as they dominated the play but failed to capitalize on the many 'golden opportunities' which were presented to them.

The goal tending became a bit staid and only six goals were scored in this period. Four were picked up by PVI and two by the Rangers. In this period as in the first, the numerous penalties did not appear to be much of a factor as far as scoring went. PVI, in the first period, was the only team to score with the man advantage. However, Bobby Whitlock picked up his second goal of the night in the second period when Mike MacDonald of the Rangers was serving a two-minute sentence for not playing by the rules.

At the 10 minute mark of this stanza coach Larter of the Rangers pulled his starting goalie, Gallant, in favor of Clayborne. It looked as if Clayborne was starting off where Gallant had left off as he was on only minutes after he appeared on the ice. However, he settled down and allowed only two more goals for the duration of the game.

CAME ON STRONG The third period was almost a replay of the second stanza with one exception; that is, the Rangers were able to outscore PVI. Four goals to one, Bobby Whitlock, who played the first 14 minutes of this period without a rest, figured in all four goals. He scored two and assisted on two. He went on to play 17 minutes of the period.

This game is the first time that these two teams picked up any points. Previously, in games against PWC and SDHD, the two power houses of the league, they have been beaten rather soundly.

In other games of the junior league, PWC dought SDHS, 6-5, in a bitterly fought match.

San Francisco Gets Cubs' Lindy MacDaniel

By JOE REICHLER MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—San Francisco Giants acquired relief specialist Lindy MacDaniel from Chicago Cubs and California Angels landed veteran first baseman Norm Siebern from Baltimore Orioles in trades that highlighted the major league baseball meetings Thursday.

The Cubs acquired two young players from the Giants—pitcher Bill Hands and catcher Randy Hundley—in exchange for the 29-year-old MacDaniel. The Cubs also threw in reserve outfielder Don Landrum.

The Orioles accepted Dick Simpson, 22-year-old rookie outfielder, for Siebern in a straight player swap.

"On the basis of what we need most," said Giants manager Herman Franks, "I think we made a terrific deal."

It was the first trade by the Cubs since they hired Leo Durocher as manager last October, and it received his full endorsement.

"We're looking to rebuild," he said, "and the only way to do it is with the young."

THIRD IN WEEK Siebern, 32, was the third veteran acquired by the Angels in the past week. The others were 35-year-old third baseman Frank Malzone and 39-year-old pitcher Lew Burdette.

"Siebern answers our need for a left-handed hitting first baseman to team with righty Joe Adcock," said manager Bill Rigney of the Angels.

From Baltimore's viewpoint it was a case of acquiring a promising hitter 10 years younger than Siebern, whom they had not counted on playing regularly anyway.

"Siebern lost the first base job to Boog Powell last year and at best he would be sitting on the bench most of the year," Orioles manager Hank Bauer said.

Simpson batted .301 at Seattle last season, hit 24 homers and drove in 78 runs. He also stole 25 bases but struck out 148 times. In 1962 he hit .315 with 42 homers and 113 RBI for San Jose of the California league.

SLUMPED BADLY Siebern, American league all-star performer in 1962 and 1964, slumped badly last season. He hit only .256 with eight home runs and 32 RBI in 106 games. He was acquired by the Orioles from Kansas City in November, 1963, for Jim Gentile and \$25,000.

The deal involving MacDaniel was the second engineered by the Giants in two days. They obtained southpaw Joe Gibbon from Pittsburgh in exchange for outfielder Matty Alou Wednesday.

Detroit Pounds Bruins; Ullman Records Six Points

DETROIT (AP)—Norm Ullman scored three goals and assisted on three others in leading Detroit Red Wings to a 10-2 victory over Boston Bruins in the only National Hockey League game played Thursday night.

Bruce McGregor added two goals for the Red Wings, who moved ahead of the Bruins into fifth place in the standings. Four of the five Detroit victories this season have been over the Bruins.

Ullman scored a goal and an assist in each period. He completed his three goals at 5:30 of the final period after taking a pass from Floyd Smith.

Gerry Cheevers replaced Boston goalie Bernie Parent at the start of the second period. Parent suffered a hand injury at Chicago Wednesday night and the soreness appeared to hamper his play in the first period.

Doug Barkley opened the scoring at 5:04 of the first period. Ullman scored his first goal 97 seconds later and Ron Murphy capped the Detroit three-goal first period at 10:27.

Ullman, Val Fonteyne, Alex Delvecchio and McGregor scored in the second period with

Murray Oliver closed out the game scoring at 7:53. Ullman's three goal set was his eighth in his NHL career. He was the league's leading goal scorer last season.

NEW YORK (AP)—An army recruiting sergeant was arrested Thursday and accused of soliciting a bribe from a New York Jets football player to help him beat the draft.

The player, Bob Schweickert, 22, was said to have reported the offer to the Jets, who called in the FBI.

Sonny Werblin, owner of the American Football League club, told radio station that Schweickert reported for a pre-induction procedure about two weeks ago, and was told by the sergeant that the matter could "be properly taken care of—\$300 would do the trick."

FBI officials identified the soldier as Staff Sgt. Winfred Lewis, 38, of The Bronx, N.Y.
