Urges Compulsory Inspection Of All Fishery Products

"Fish consumption would increase if the fishing industry introduced compulsory inspection on all products", stated Mr. Paul Gallant, President of the Prince Edward Island Fisheries Federation Wednesday afternoon in a discussion on the new Fish Inspection Act.

"Canada is one of the lowest fish eating countries in the world and we have lots of fish available. The reason is because we do not get high quality fish, stated Mr. Gallant.

"It is high time we inaugurated compulsory inspection", continued Mr. Gallant. "We need good inspectors, and I do not mean to insinuate that the present inspectors are not good. Let us in the fishing industry be on the alert and the inspectors will be on the alert. Appoint a man on his good qualities, and not on politics alone", he stated.

Mr. John Myrick, Tignish, stated he would like to see more inspection including boat inspection. He thought that they should be careful to distinguish between compulsory grading and compulsory inspection and doubted if the fish processors were ready for compulsory grading.

Mr. Donald MacLean of New Brunswick stated there were only two grades in his plant, A-1 and bad. He stated that his plant could have their own inspectors and put up a product they could stand behind.

Mr. Gallant pointed out that 92% of the distillates in the Maritimes were not large enough to afford inspectors and only through Government inspectors could they put their goods on the market.

Mr. W. A. Moore, Deputy Minister of Industry and Development in New Brunswick said that the consumers should be educated about the different grades of fish. Most consumers do not know what they are buying, he stated.

He recounted seeing fish for sale on Frederick street when it was 90 degrees in the shade and the blood from it was running onto the street. "If I had anything to do with it, that man would be in jail", he stated.

Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources stated that it was running through his mind that the big shot in the industry did not want their brands known.

Several processors opposed a section in the new act which stated in part that "An inspector or constable may arrest without a warrant any person found committing an offense against the act."

Mr. Donald MacLean wondered if the Department had men qualified to arrest the processor. "This is leading to dictatorship, not democracy", he stated. Dr. E. D. Fraser, Chief Surgeon for the Department in the Maritimes stated that it was aimed at outside men from other countries.

Let's Talk It Over A Prince County Viewpoint

As a truly democratic procedure, the electing of Mayors and Councilors by acclamation, or for that matter, the electing of members of Parliament or even assistant dog catchers by acclamation, leaves something to be desired.

The man who is elected by acclamation is not elected by unanimous wish, far from it. It is even possible he may not have the confidence of a majority of the voters. It may be argued that if one is dissatisfied with a candidate, he can persuade some other man to run, or offer himself. This is true, but the rank and file of voters may not be capable of holding office, and may not wield sufficient influence to bring out an alternative candidate.

Electing by acclamation may be the result of the approval of a great majority of the electors for the man nominated, and of a realization of the futility of opposing him. It may also, however, be the result of an indifferent electorate who do not take their democratic rights and privileges seriously, and who are sluggish in the exercise of these rights. This is indeed a deplorable state of affairs.

We believe citizens should strive to reduce elections by acclamation to a minimum. If at all possible, the best men available should be persuaded to contest the election with the present office holders. If those men are elected, they are the "people's choice" and should hold office. If they are defeated, they have still rendered a service in making it possible for the re-elected ones to receive a new expression of trust and confidence, and a new mandate from the people to carry out the work they have been doing. It is well worth the expense of holding elections. Let us begin to forget our heritage of freedom, let the "voice of the people" be heard when election time comes around.
