told the meeting it was up to organizations like the institute to bring culture to the rural areas. This has been done so far through the Drama and Musical Festivals, sewing clubs and other projects. One Thousand At Reuters Centenary
LONDON, July 11.—(Reuters)—One thousand persons, including the world's leading newspaper men, gathered here tonight to salute the basic principles of truthful reporting—freedom and accuracy—at a banquet honoring the 100th anniversary of Reuters News Agency.
Kent Cooper, executive director of the Associated Press, delivered the keynote address. Cooper said that the truth is a groundwork for international peace—and countries get the truth wherever newspapers operate without government control to collect and distribute the news.
Both the AP and Reuters gather and distribute news on a co-operative basis under newspaper control. The AP marked its 100th anniversary three years ago.
Cooper spoke to men and women from 40 countries who are here this week to honor the world-wide news agency which was founded by a German, Baron Paul Julius Reuters, in 1851 in a two-room London office.
It became a co-operative during the Second World War. Cooper toasted Reuters as "a very great institution," and paid tribute to its general manager, Christopher Chancellor, who was awarded a knighthood in the King's birthday honors list but has not been invested with the title due to the King's recent illness.
Cooper spoke of the value of freedom and to public well-being of the co-operative news-agency method as represented by the AP and Reuters.
Among the guests at the dinner were Prime Minister Atlee, members of his Cabinet, and prominent figures of the church, law literature, industry, sports and entertainment.
In the newspaper field representing Canada, were Gillis Purcell, general manager of the Canadian Press, and Mrs. Purcell; Edwin S. Johnson, chief of CP's London Bureau; W. H. Woolnough, vice-president of the Southern newspapers of Canada; and Mrs. Woolnough, and W. G. Matters of the London office of the Toronto Star and Mrs. Matters.

Revision of Bylaws
Mrs. Helen D. Herring, Charlottetown, reported for the Constitution Committee, and stated that her committee had been working on the revision of the organization's bylaws, but that they would not be completed until the coming year.
With five thousand members in the present organization, a vast increase over the membership when the bylaws were drawn up, many drastic changes have been necessary, and the Ontario Institutes have consented to let the P. E. I. W. I. copy their excellent rules for procedure.
As convener of the Home Economics Committee, Mrs. Murdoch MacGowan, Kilmuir, suggested in her report that the School Lunch problem was still one which should receive a great deal of thought.
Reporting for Social Welfare and Education, Mrs. W. E. MacKinnon, Uigg, told the meeting that assistance, financial and otherwise, had been given in re-organizing the Children's Aid Society on a Province-wide basis.
Referring to the need of this Society, she stated that all delinquent children who are committed to Court in this Province are maintained in Nova Scotia institutions at a cost to the Provincial Government of over \$1,200 each, per year.
She continued by stressing the importance of the recent dental survey made by the Department of Health and Welfare and suggested the success or failure of the recommended preventative program in rural areas is largely up to W. I. members.
"The good citizen is one who looks beyond his own personal interests and takes his portion of the general burden," said Mrs. R. L. Burge, St. Peter's Bay in giving the report of her committee on Citizenship. She added that every one has a different service to offer, but whatever his calling, the good citizen is forever trying to make his community a better, happier and healthier place in which to live.
