FIRE IN HALIFAX.

Dempster's Factory Destroyed.

Many Men Out of Employment.

HALIFAX, Oct. 27. John Dempster's large wood-working factory was totally destroyed by fire early this morning. The first known of the danger was smoke issuing from the centre of the building, which was noticed by the night watchman.

The Direct-Hal Pointer Race.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 27. The Direct-Hal Pointer race at Columbia to-day was won by Direct. The time for the first heat was 2:09; for the second, 2:08; and for the third, 2:08 1/2. This beats the world's record for harness horses.

Withdrawal of Steamers.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27. Mr. Stairs, M. P. for Halifax, waited upon the Postmaster-General to-day to protest against the withdrawal of the Allan and Dominion steamships from Halifax during the winter.

More Bomb Throwing.

DUBLIN, Oct. 27. When the staff of the National Press, the organ of the McCarthyites, were about to begin their work last night, a bomb fell in the area in front of the window where the editors' rooms are situated.

They're Not Satisfied.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27. Austrian letters say that British traders and settlers in New Hebrides are dissatisfied at the disadvantages they are subject to compared with the French, by the regulations of the Imperial Government.

Miners on Strike.

LONDON, Oct. 27. In Staffordshire and Worcestershire thousands of miners struck against a reduction of ten per cent in wages.

PENANQUISHENE, Que., Oct. 25.—The house of farmer John Cummings, near here, was burned to-day. Three of the children perished in the flames and the mother was probably fatally burned in rescuing one child.

BELORADE, Oct. 24.—Great excitement has been caused here by the news that the Austrian government has decided to keep three gunboats at Semlin, as Danube cruisers.

NEW YORK.—A special from Buenos Ayres to the Herald states that President Pellegrini has issued a proclamation declaring the cabinet crisis over.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Standard says the approach of frost has caused a renewal of pestilence in the district of Porm. A half of the population of the Reozzon died of hunger and disease.

NORT SYDNEY, C. B., Oct. 24.—MacKenzie Bowell, minister of customs, and Messrs. Schriber, Archibald, Pottinger, Laurie and Donkin, made a trip of inspection to-day of the Cape Breton railway from Causo to Sydney.
