IMPORTANT TO MILITIA OFFICERS.

New Regulations to be Enforced at Once.

RECIPROCAL TARIFF REGULATIONS.

Rules for Our Merchants.

OTTAWA, July 10.—It now transpires what some of the sweeping changes that have been threatened in the militia force are to be: Lieutenant-Colonels who have attained the age of 60 years, majors who have attained the age of 58 years, captains who have attained the age of 50 years and Lieutenants who have attained the age of 45 years will, unless under very exceptional circumstances, be placed on the retired list.

This regulation will also apply to the regimental staff officers.

No officer having attained the limit of age mentioned above is to be recommended for promotion or appointment to that rank.

District Officers Commanding are required to immediately submit a list of the officers retireable under the foregoing regulations which go into effect immediately.

An increase of pay will be granted at the rate of 50 cents per day to all officers of the permanent corps, except the commandant after four years of substantive service, and a further increase of 50 cents per day after eight years of service—provided that they have not received a step of substantive rank during the interval. Permanent officers performing the duty of Adjutants will be allowed 50 cents extra per diem.

The notice is the outcome of the trouble in the Queen's Own, Toronto.

Regulations in regard to the reciprocal tariff of Canada have been issued by the Minister of Customs as follows: Persons making an entry of goods under the Canadian reciprocal regulations of 1878 are to furnish a separate invoice of the articles entitled to such entry, with a declaration annexed thereto from the exporter or his agent, made before a notary public or commissioner for taking oaths or the chief municipal officer of the city or town or the British Council, or before a president or secretary of the Chamber of Commerce as to the origin and value of the article in a form prescribed. The following directions are added.

Where invoices are made out at prices below a fair market value for consumption in the country of exporting invoices must show in separate column or otherwise by addition thereto, such fair market value.

Militia Officer Retired.

OTTAWA, July 10.—Major J. A. Black, who has been on the pay list of the active militia as Brigade Major for Nova Scotia district, has been retired and transferred to the infantry reserve of officers.

Fatal Train Accident.

MONCTON, July 10.—A little girl named Bourke was killed by the Shediac train last evening a few miles east of here.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

Lagos, British West Africa, July 8.—A body of troops in the employ of the British Niger Company reports having discovered and pursued the fugitive king of Benin. During the pursuit three towns were captured by the troops with severe loss to the natives, but the king succeeded in escaping. The troops lost Lieut. Fitzgerald and two men killed.

LONDON, July 8.—This evening, at the Hotel Cecil, the Cordwainers' Company gave a banquet to the colonial premier and their wives. Sir Wilfred Laurier and Lady Laurier sat on the right and left respectively of the master of the company and covers were laid for 300 guests.

LONDON, July 8.—Mr. John Redmond, M. P., the Parnellite leader, by special permission of the British government, paid a long visit on Jubilee day to the Irish political prisoners in Portland prison. Throughout that day he stayed with them in their cells and he tells the associated press that some of the cases are desperate. Henry Wilson and Burton, Mr. Redmond adds, are complete wrecks. They are permitted to be seated whenever they like and are only lightly worked. He fears they will die unless speedily released. Harrigan is demented and if released will have to be restrained, like Dr. Thomas Gallagher and Albert C. Whitehead. Altogether, there only five Irish political prisoners undergoing imprisonment. The ordinary convicts of Portland prison are mostly employed in the quarries and in the open air. The Irish political prisoners, however are closely confined to indoor labor all the week, and are not allowed out except on Sundays.

Mr. Redmond is in constant communications with the government in regard to prisoners, and recently secured a special commission of London doctors to report on their cases.
