#### Prof. Harcourt at Vernon River.

PROF. HARCOURT addressed the farmers of Vernon River on Friday last. Though the roads were not good there was a large attendance. Much interest was manifested. He dwelt principally on the dairy industry, spoke of the advantages the island possessed for the manufacture of the best butter and cheese, good grazing land, plenty of water, cool night shade, etc., and pointed out how much a system would increase the material prosperity of farmers, and thereby promote the general welfare.

The Professor advised the farmers to give more attention to the rearing and care of stock—to keep only such as yielded a reasonable profit. He strongly recommended the growth of corn for ensilage, thus supplying a cheap and profitable food for the stock. The Professor's address was highly interesting and instructive, and received the well-merited thanks of the meeting.

### An Interesting Document.

The following very interesting document, found amongst the papers of the late Chief Justice Palmer, by his son H. James Palmer, Esq., has been handed to THE EXAMINER for publication:—

#### HEAD QUARTERS,

BELLEVEU, LE 49, July 13, 1812.

By his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's Proclamation dated the 10th inst. and hereunto annexed, it appears that His Majesty's subjects have now an opportunity of evincing their Loyalty and attachment to the best of Sovereigns, and our most glorious constitution. We are all called upon to defend our lives, our liberties and property against the aggression of a licentious enemy. The officers and privates of the South Battalion of Queen's County Militia will not suffer themselves to be surpassed by that zeal and energetic spirit which has been already manifested in various other parts of the island; but they will by their unanimity, subordination and prompt discharge of their duty, show an example which will do honor to themselves and their posterity.

His Majesty's Colonial Government are using every means in their power to procure the requisite Military supplies; there is strong reason to suppose that a satisfactory communication will soon be made on the subject; but as the enemy has already availed himself of a prompt outset against an unprepared people, it will be incumbent on all His Majesty's Subjects to be vigilant and particularly incumbent on this Battalion from its exposed situation and proximity to attack; and here our Boats and Small Craft can be of essential service. Crews should be immediately appointed in readiness to man every boat, in case of attack by water, to prevent confusion at the time; and every boat should have proper Oars and Rigging, Boat-hooks and Boarding Pikes, or the best substitutes that can be made in lieu thereof.

Musquets, Swords and other Arms now out of order, but capable of being effectually repaired should be sent directly to the Arm-works of St. John's West-Loose or to the Gunsmiths of the Arsenal, or for Bullets to be cast at the Arm-works, or for Slugs, the unnecessary lighting of Fires, Flambeaux, or Brands, or discharging Guns, should be prevented; and persons being in retired situations should establish private signals of correspondence with their next neighbors. Those who are unable to do so cannot be immediately furnished, should not prevent Officers from drilling and disciplining their men. Any man can form the shape of a musket, which will answer the purpose sufficiently for exercise until better can be had. In fire there is scarcely any thing which cannot be effected by a willing disposition which prevades in the breast of every individual in this district.

The Officers will consider the important duty they have to discharge, they will each cautiously examine the local situation of their company, and faithfully look to strengthen the places most likely to be attacked. They will enquire into the state of their corps. They will investigate and call forth its resources. They themselves have been chosen only by their merit. They will upon the same impartial principles recommend, and bring forward their men, steady and determined in their conduct, kind and minute in their attention to individuals, abstemious yet hospitable, as far as prudence permits; encouraging uniformity of dress, discouraging expensive equipment. The free use of Spirituous Liquors should be avoided. Silence should be strictly preferred at night, and all but the centinels and those on duty should retire early to rest. The Officers will receive their private orders and signals through the regular channels; and they will feel the need of keeping those orders secret.

The Officers at present honored with the command of the South Battalion in the absence of the Colonel of the Regt (who is now with the North Battalion) beg leave to assure the corps of officers and the South Battalion in general that as soon as the final return from the duty on which he is about to proceed he will use his utmost exertions in the district, in conjunction with the corps, to facilitate the execution of His Majesty's commands, the good of the service and the honor of the Battalion.

THE only variation in quality which will ever be found in Myrtle Navy tobacco is in the degrees of moisture which it contains. Tobacco is a very readily absorbent of moisture, and in unusual states of the weather it may become a little too moist or a little too dry to suit the taste of some. This is a minor matter, however, as the essential quality of the tobacco is not changed. Its combustion is a little slower or a little faster, according to the degree of moisture, that is all. The darker the plug the greater the moisture, and many prefer the dark. In each caddy, however, the preference for for either can be met.

#### INCREASE OF CAPITAL STOCK.

At the Annual Meeting of the Shareholders of the Merchants' Bank of Prince Edward Island, held at its Banking House, Charlottetown, the following By-Law was unanimously passed:—
