Marciano Meets Charles In Title Bout Tonight

NEW YORK (AP)—Rocky Marciano, undefeated in 45 fights, puts his punching skill against ex-champ Ezzard Charles at Yankee stadium tonight in the third defence of his world heavyweight title.
The 29-year-old Brockton, Mass., slugger still is a solid 18-to-5 choice over the 32-year-old Cincinnati Negro who dares dispute the ring's oldest legend: "They never come back."

Odds are 2 to 1 that Charles won't be around to fight the full 15 rounds and 6 to 1 he won't be able to stop Marciano. The pick here is Marciano in eight rounds.

The match, scheduled for 10:30 p.m. (EDT) will be seen only on theatre television in some 61 theatres in 45 cities outside the New York area. There will be a radio broadcast (ABC).

Despite forecast cloudy weather, the International Boxing Club still talks of a \$500,000 gate and 40,000 fans. The reserved seats are scaled from \$40 to \$5 with 10,000 general admission tickets at \$3 to go on sale tonight.

CANVAS IF RAIN
In case of bad weather the ring will be protected by a canvas canopy. Should the light be postponed, it will be put back a week to Thursday, June 24.

This is the second chance for Charles to win back the title he held for two years until Jersey Joe Walcott knocked him out at Pittsburgh three years ago. Charles missed by a close margin in a return fight with Walcott at Philadelphia in 1952.
Jim Corbett tried twice to win back the title. Bob Fitzsimmons, Jim Jeffries, Max Schmeling, Joe Louis, Jack Dempsey, Walcott and Charles himself were the others who failed to lick the jinx.

In case Charles wins, there will be a return match in September. If Marciano wins, he probably will defend in September against Don Cockell, Hurricane Tommy Jackson or Nino Valdes.
Marciano gets 40 per cent, Charles 20 per cent of everything, including the gate, about \$200,000 from theatre-TV and \$35,000 from radio.

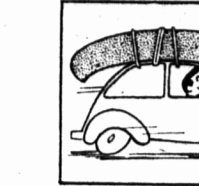

Bosox End Losing Streak By Edging Detroit Tigers 3-2

Boston Red Sox broke an eight-game losing streak Wednesday with a 3-2 victory over Detroit Tigers while Philadelphia Athletics had their winning string broken at five games by losing 11-6 to Chicago's sagging White Sox.

Two unearned runs—the tying and winning runs—gave Boston its win through shoddy infield play by the Tigers. Willard Nixon, hurling four-hit ball, became Boston's first pitcher to go the distance since June 7. He retired the last 13 Tigers in order.

Detroit's starter, Ned Garver, permitted only one earned run—Grady Hatton's homer in the first inning—but the Tigers committed three errors behind him.

Chicago topped the A's with a seven-run seventh inning, capped by Ferris Fain's grand slam homer. The game's unsung hero was Chico Carrasquel, who drove across four runs, two with a bases-loaded single to start the big Chicago seventh.

A'S STARTED WELL

Sandy Consuegra picked up the victory. Sonny Dixon lost before the big seventh, the Athletics were off to a nice start with Bill Renna's three-run homer in the first and Lou Limmer's homer with none aboard in the third.

Jim Hearn, New York Giant right-hander, pitched his first shutout of the season in the only National League day game. His fourth-inning homer helped the Giants down Cincinnati Redlegs 4-0.

A three-run outburst against southpaw Joe Nuxhall in the second inning and rookie catcher Ray Katt's home run in the sixth accounted for all the league leaders' runs.

National League games between Chicago and Pittsburgh and St. Louis and Philadelphia were rained out. Milwaukee was at Brooklyn for a night game and Washington-Cleveland and New York-Baltimore night games were scheduled in the American League.
