Wanted, One Fight Promoter

Charlotte's dynamic promoter of defunctable boxing fare, Ivan Docherty, was telling us the other day that he is getting out of the business. He had pretty much made up his mind about the decision last summer but not until recently did he make the decision a definite one.

The reason is that the line between black and red on the ledger books is a thin one, although most of the books that have been more or less financially successful. The overhead is such that it is a risky business for anyone whose finances are strictly limited. For if for any reason at all a scheduled bout has to be called off at the last minute the promoter has to have a considerable amount of cash on hand to cover expenses, rentals, etc.

"The only reason I got into the boxing game in the first place," says Ivan, "was to get the sport back on its feet here in Charlotte. It's in a pretty healthy condition right now and for anyone who wants to get into the promoting end of it now, it's a good time as any time. It will have to be either an individual or perhaps some community club with enough cash and a willingness to take a chance."

Actually the chance to be taken isn't at all a big one. Ivan has brought boxing back to Charlotte with something of a bang and enthusiasm is at a high level. There is no reason to believe that a card bringing together a few well-matched fighters shouldn't draw well and make the promoters a sizeable hunk of moolah. It might be something that local clubs such as the Kiwanis or Kinsmen who need funds to keep their commendable community projects afloat should look into. Anyway there is no harm done in investigating the possibilities.

over Canada in the international PGA matches. Canada got only 2½ points in six singles matches while the United States rolled up 15½. Adding Monday's four ball matches, in which the United States gained 3½ points to 3¼ for Canada, the victory was 21-6. It was the fifth straight triumph for the U.S.

There have been wider differences in the score but this year's victory was the most lopsided on the basis of the comparative number of points. The margin was 3½ to 1. In other years the scoring was different, making the point totals larger.

TOTAL VALUE 3 POINTS
Bolt beat Al Balding of Toronto 3 and 2 and made 2½ points. Bolt won the first nine three up but they halved the second nine to give Balding his half-point.

Each match has a total value of three points, one awarded to the winner of each nine and one to the winner of the match.

Cary Middlecoff won three points by defeating Gordon Brydson of Toronto 3 and 1. Middlecoff shot 71 over the 7,100 yard Colonial Country Club course. Brydson had a 76.

Fleck crushed Jack Kay of Montreal 3 and 1 and earned three points. Kay shot an eight-over-par 78.

Gene Littler notched 2½ points for the U.S. by beating Stan Leonard of Lachute, Que., one up. Littler shot a 72, Leonard 73. The latter got a half point by squaring the last nine.

WON ALL SINGLES MATCHES
Big Mike Souchak downed Bill Mawhinney of Vancouver 3 and 2 and won two points to Mawhinney's one. Souchak shot a 73, Mawhinney 75.

Ted Kroll won 2½ points to ½ for Murray Tucker of Toronto by beating the Canadian 2 and 1 with a 75 medal score. Tucker had a 77.

The United States received the Fleekins Trophy for its smashing triumph during which it lost only one four-ball match and no singles.

The trophy is contributed by John Jay Hopkins, New York industrialist who founded the International Golf Association. Bolt and Fleck shared the \$100 which Hopkins put up for the low score of the day. Hopkins also pays each of the players from both countries \$750 and expenses for participating in the matches.

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"NEWK" BLANKS CUBS ON 3 HITS

Three Homers Help Yanks Nip Tribe; Boston Wins

Three home runs, one of them Mickey Mantle's 10th of the season, carried New York Yankees to a 4-3 victory over Cleveland Tuesday. The triumph was the American League champions' first-place margin over the Tribe to four games.

Hank Bauer and Elston Howard were the other New York home run hitters at Yankee Stadium. All were off the deliveries of Early Wynn, who was charged with his first defeat after three victories.

Howard's four-bagger, a long high drive to deep left, popped out the low barrier into the visiting team's bullpen. Johnny Kucks went the distance for the Yanks, yielding 10 hits, including a home run by Al Smith in the eighth inning. The Yankees collected nine hits off Wynn, who was routed in the eighth.

Boston Red Sox edged Chicago White Sox 4-3 in a 13-inning contest at Boston. Dick Gernert, who started the scoring with his fifth homer, finished it with a single. Pinch-runner Billy Conso crossed the plate with the deciding run from third base with one out. Red Sox righthander Frank Sul-

livan and White Sox southpaw Billy Pierce were not around at the finish despite solid efforts. Rookie Dave Sisler, third Boston hurler, got credit for the triumph.

DODGERS BLANK CUBS
The stumbling Brooklyn Dodgers perked up with a three-hit pitching job by Don Newcombe and Gil Hodges' three-run homer for a 6-0 National League victory over Chicago Cubs. Hodges also singled across a run for four RBIs.

Newcombe took his fourth decision against one defeat and the victory ended a three-game losing streak for the Dodgers. Loser for the Cubs, who have only one victory in their last 11 games, was Warren Hacker. He lasted only three innings, being nicked for five runs and six hits before he left for a pinch-hitter in the Cub third.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — St. Louis Cardinals knocked out Robin Roberts with a five-run rally in a third inning capped by Rip Repulski's three-run homer and went on to wallop Philadelphia Phillies 9-1 Tuesday night. Rookie Hal Smith also drove in three runs, two of them with his first major league home run.

Willard Schmidt started for the Cardinals and yielded only four singles, three by Marv Flybeck.

It was only the second defeat for the Redlegs in their last 12 games.
