(Received over Pittfield and Co's Private Wire) NEW YORK, July 15—While some reaction could logically have taken place yesterday, each time the market sold off slightly it became dull and finally closed with a burst of strength. In fact the Dow Jones industrial average made a new high for the year. This development will likely bring additional buyers into the market from the followers of the Dow Jones theory. Some well known observers of this theory have been out of the market but the new high yesterday is a signal. There were some predictions made that when the industrial average made a new high, a new advance would be inaugurated that would carry these averages 20 points higher. The majority of stocks remain a purchase on all small setbacks, we believe.

GRAIN

CHICAGO, July 15—A maximum rise of five cents a bushel in wheat values at Kansas City today accompanied reports that millers there were buying all the wheat in sight. Paralleling this was a wild flurry to purchase wheat futures in Chicago, but the extreme upturn here was limited to 4-1-4 cents. Advice that the Canadian wheat crop was deteriorating at a rapid rate acted as the chief stimulus here, aside from the Kansas City bulge. With heavy profit taking sales in progress here at the last, wheat closed nervous, 2 cents to 2-3-4 cents above yesterday's finish. Sept 1.04 5-8 to 7-8, Dec 1.06 3-4 to 7-8, corn 2-1-4 to 3-1-8 up Sept. 82 7-8 to 83, Dec 77 1-4 to 3-8, oats 1-1-8 to 1-1-2 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 20 cents.

MONTREAL, July 15—Cattle section was at standstill with calf and hog divisions steady in early dealings on Montreal livestock markets today. There were not enough sheep and lambs to establish a market. Receipts: Cattle 19; calf, 42; hog 132; sheep and lamb, 7. Calves were steady at recent decline selling from \$3 to \$3.50 for grassers up to \$5.50 for medium good calves. Bacon was \$9.75 fed and watered while select drew the usual \$1 premium. Butchers' heavies and lights were \$9.25 and extra heavies \$9.75, with some selling from \$6 to \$7. One lot of hogs were sold rail grade at \$13 per hundred-weight. Hog prices advanced on Maritime markets selling at \$12.25 rail grade \$9.25 weighed off truck and \$9.60 weighed off cars. Steers sold up to \$5 with butcher cows up to \$3.75 and bulls up to \$3.25. Canners were \$1 to \$1.75 and cutters from \$1.75 to \$2.25. Calves were slower selling from \$2.50 to \$3. Grassers - 12.50 for grassers to \$5 for weaners. Lambs were down to \$7.50.

Summer Dullness Affects Market

MONTREAL, July 15.—(CP)—Stock trends pointed upward today as midsummer dullness settled on the market.

Newsprint stocks, recent leaders, took a back seat and St. Lawrence Corp. Preferred and St. Lawrence Paper Preferred eased fractionally. Howard Smith firmed 1-2 to 1-4 while Bathurst and Dryden finished even.

Outstanding gainer was Canada Cement Preferred, up three points in good demand to 80, highest in two years. While Foundation eased narrowly, both Steel of Canada issues, Gypsum Lime and Cement Common advanced 1-8 to 1-2 each. In metals, Hollinger and Noranda showed up the best with fractional gains at 15 1-2 and 50 1-2 respectively. Nickel and Smelters remained unchanged. Dominion Textile gained a couple of points at 67 1-2.

Sold heavily, National Steel declined nearly a point to 18 1-2 and Canada Corp Preferred dipped 1-2 to 18 1-2. Canada Car Common and C.P.R. traded lightly and held even. B. C. Power, up a point at 30 3-4, led the Utilities. Higher prices ruled for Southern Canada Power, Shawinigan, Montreal and Brantford, while Canada Northern Power eased 1-2. Royal Bank eased a couple of points to 187.

Number Of Issues Reach High Peaks

(By Frank MacMillan, Associated Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, July 15.—(AP)—The stock market was bounced about by profit taking squalls today but managed to make the home port with most of its rigging intact.

Earnings and high dividend hopes lent support to many new issues, a number of which closed up 1 to 2 or more points at new five-year peaks.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks edged up 1/4 of a point to 65.5, another new peak since July 6, 1931. It was the seventh day's consecutive advance of this average. Transfers totaled 1,978,244 shares, the largest since April 30 last. Yesterday's aggregate was 1,659,630.

Westinghouse gained 2 7-8 at 133 7-8. Electrical appliance sales continued to show better than seasonal performance.

Consolidated Edison was up 1-8 at 41 3-8. The company restored pay cuts of \$3,500,000 without altering working hours.

American Telephone, off 1-3-4 at 17 7-8, was backward throughout. Tech. rails gave a favorable performance, with a few oils in demand. Among gainers were Chesapeake & Ohio, up 1 1-8 at 68 5-8, a new high since 1929; Chesapeake Corp., up 2 at 81 1-2, and Allegheny Corp. preference shares, up more than 3 each. Earnings were broadcast of an increased C. & O. dividend.

ANSWER TO PRAYER BRINGS JOY TO AMY BAKER, WAR NURSE

TORONTO, July 15 (OP)—War Nurse Amy Baker, for the past 13 years proprietor of a tiny, glassed-in newsstand at Yonge and Gerrard streets in Toronto, was looking forward today to revisiting Vimy Ridge and other war-time scenes where she spent four turbulent years.

A group of Toronto citizens who insisted on remaining anonymous have co-operated to take care of the ex-nurses expenses and she will be one of thousands of pilgrims to attend the unveiling of the Canadian memorial at Vimy.

A short time ago, in a newspaper interview, Miss Baker expressed her great desire to join the pilgrimage and told of her inability to obtain enough money, to make the trip. This week-end the good news came that a group had arranged to provide her with the money.

So Miss Baker, wounded and gassed at Vimy, will see again the places where she labored to bring comfort and release from pain to many a war-torn Tommy.

"I have never regretted it," she added, "even at the cost of my career as a nurse."

"The possibility of going to Vimy seemed an opportunity to recapture that great moment," she said, "and I am more grateful than I can say to those friends who made the possibility a reality."

While in England, Miss Baker will visit her only two close relatives—two sisters, one of whom is paralyzed from service as a war nurse.

"I'm going back to see the King unveil that great monument to our boys—I can truly say this is an answer to prayer," said ex-nurse Baker.

Alvin Karpis Pleads Guilty of Kidnapping

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. PAUL, July 14—Alvin Karpis, once the most sought criminal in the United States who had boasted he would never be taken alive, muttered a subdued "yes," today to admit his guilt in the \$100,000 ransom kidnaping of William Hamm, St. Paul brewer.

His plea provided a dramatic opening for what was to have been his Federal Court trial on the abduction charge.

Karpis, born in Montreal of Lithuanian parents, was brought here by a second St. Paul abduction, that of Edward G. Bremer, bank president, who paid \$200,000 for his freedom six months after the June, 1933, Hamm kidnaping.

With Karpis convicted by his own statement, the trial of two alleged confederates of his in the Hamm kidnaping got under way immediately.
