PC Candidates Cite Highways

"The Shaw government laid more pavement in the third district of Prince since 1959 than the Liberal government laid in the entire province in its tenure from 1946 to 1958," third Prince Conservative candidate Keith Harrington said last night.

"This is the record in road construction across the Island by the Shaw government he said. Our resource roads, roads to fishing centres, all weather highways that will soon connect the extremities of the Island, are the backbone of the new expansion in the P.E.I. economy, he said.

"No longer are our fishermen and farmers hawking in mud in the spring and our goods and services will soon move across the Island without regard to weather and other restrictions. Our Liberal opponents are masters at knocking our programs, is it perhaps that many of them care not to remember the pathetic condition of our roads before the Shaw administration.

Harrington and his team-mate Hon. Henry Wedge were speaking at Evangelical Regional High School in Egmont Bay.

"Before 1959 there were exactly 6 miles of pavement in the 3rd district, he said. Now there are 84 miles.

Education Stressed At PC Meeting

"Education is the most important industry on the Island, Peter McAulay, Conservative candidate in First Kings, said last night.

Mr. McAulay and his running-mate Keith MacKenzie were speaking at St. Charles Hall.

"The education system of this province has been preparing our youth for export to other parts of Canada, but it is the aim of the S.C. government to provide the opportunity these young people need to keep them on the Island.

"The record of the Shaw government in education is self-evident. The Shaw government has taken Island education out of the little red school house age and placed it in the era of the regional unit. These regional units have shown their ability to keep students in school who would otherwise have dropped out

under the old one room school system.

"With this education system providing the well trained youth and industrial development moving ahead at a never before believed pace in this province, there will never again be need for our young people to go elsewhere to seek livelihood.

COMPARES RECORD
Keith MacKenzie compared the record of the Shaw government in industrial development with the record of the previous Liberal government. In the 20 some years of Liberal administration virtually nothing was done in the province to develop industry. Our children left the province in droves because the government could not or would not provide the opportunities for them to stay at home, said Mr. MacKenzie.

Heat Now On In Commons To Step Up Session Pace

OTTAWA (CP)—With tulips and tourists blossoming in Ottawa, the heat is on in Parliament to step up the law-making pace and clear the way for a summer recess.

House leaders of the five parties were expected to continue discussions this week on the organization of the session from now until the recess, expected in mid-July.

The government is proposing an informal list of priority bills it wants to pass before the recess. In meetings last week, opposition representatives requested details.

Monday the Commons observed the Victoria Day holiday. Today the first item is expected to be second reading of the government reorganization bill, which juggles the responsibilities of six ministers.

Next, the House will debate four related bills reorganizing the civil service and setting up collective bargaining machinery for civil servants. These will be sent to a special Commons-Senate committee for hearings.

A government spokesman said other bills on the recess must list include:—Introduction of a revised Bank Act and sending it to a committee for extensive public hearings. Speculation is rife that the six-per-cent interest ceiling will be modified.

—The Canada Assistance plan, which would integrate and improve four existing welfare programs for needy mothers, the blind and disabled, unemployed workers whose insurance benefits have run out and needy persons over 65.

—A \$500,000 fund to assist the construction and expansion of medical schools and teaching hospitals during the next 15 years.

—The federal-provincial medical care insurance plan, scheduled to go into operation July 1, 1967. Interested provinces will set up their own plans along four basic principles and Ottawa will pay half the costs.

—Increasing the \$40,000,000 fund for loans to university students.

—Creation of the Company of Young Canadians, a Crown corporation that would send volunteer young social workers into slums and depressed areas and emerging countries abroad.

All these priority items were promised by the Liberals in the campaign for the Nov. 8 election, or earlier.

The Commons passed little significant legislation in the first three months of the session. But the pace has picked up steadily since MPs came back after the Easter recess.

Bills passed in the last month included a \$50,000,000 rural development fund, creation of a science council, of three elected councillors to the Northwest Territories Council, expansion of credit for farmers and fishermen, and approval of the free-trade agreement with the United States.
