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Lack Of Cooperation Stressed At Rally

Lack of cooperation on the part of the federal government came under attack by several Conservative speakers at the YPC rally in Souris last evening. Speaking before an audience in the Souris Regional High School, Kings County MP, Melvin McQuaid pointed out that the federal government has refused to supply the names of those citizens over 70 who the Shaw government could begin the payment of the additional \$25 a month for old-age pensioners. "Several attempts," he said, "were made to have these names given. Yet each time the Liberal government in Ottawa refused to give their cooperation."

In the major address, Premier Walter Shaw stated that a National Park would be built in eastern Kings if the federal government would cooperate with the provincial government. "We wholeheartedly endorse the alternative of the Souris Board of Trade and the people of eastern Kings in their suggestion that their park should follow the shore line," the Premier stated. He said that the Liberals in Ottawa wanted to take away some of the best farm land in the province for a park. "This would ruin some of the richest agricultural land available in the province; instead it would be far better to have the park located along the shoreline as suggested by the Board of Trade so that the farm area could continue to be used for farming."

INCREASED BUDGET
Mr. McQuaid pointed out that the Shaw government had greatly increased the budget of both the Department of Agriculture and of Fisheries, despite the Liberal claims to the contrary. In agriculture, he said, the budget is 3 1/2 times that allotted in 1958. In fisheries, the budget has increased from \$30,000 in 1958 to \$222,000 in 1966. In closing, Premier Shaw said that it was not the promises given at election time that counted, but who was done during the four years between elections. "All you have to do is look around you and you will see that there has been tremendous development in all sections of the province."

Other speakers were Highways Minister Keith MacKenzie and his running mate, Peter MacAulay. Chairman of the meeting was Charles Campbell, provincial president of the YPC's. Other platform guests included Albert Fogarty and Hon. Leo Rossiter.

Conservation officers will be carrying out a variety of duties in connection with fish and wildlife conservation in the province. Major responsibilities will be the enforcement of legislation pertaining to sport fish and wildlife and the carrying out of a predator-control program in their respective areas. Wildlife education and extension work will also be a major responsibility, and officers will be expected to advise and assist local organizations on fish and wildlife conservation projects in their areas.

Vehicle Plunges Over Wharf

SUMMERSIDE — Three young Summerside men in a 1956 convertible Ford went over the end of the railway wharf here into approximately 30 feet of water, early yesterday afternoon. It was unofficially reported that when the vehicle hit the wharf, the convertible top released and moments later the three occupants, Wendell Grady, who is the owner and was also the driver at the time of the accident, Francis Arsenault and Buck Louis, swam to the surface. Grady received cuts to his hands and arms but the other two men were reported not to have suffered any injuries. Town police were at the scene shortly after the accident occurred at approximately 1:10 p.m. and conducted the investigation. Tire marks, reported to have been made by the car, measured 165 feet from where they began to where the vehicle went over.

It was not known last evening if the owner would attempt to recover the vehicle.

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Ottawa Reports 2-Month Surplus
OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government had a surplus of \$328,500,000 in April and May, first two months of the new fiscal year, the finance department reported Friday. This compared with a surplus of \$407,000,000 in the same period last year. Revenues rose to \$1,353,600,000 and expenditures climbed to \$1,025,100,000 from \$935,600,000. Expenditures increased in all departments except defence and veterans' affairs, which dropped to \$181,100,000 from \$193,400,000 and to \$57,700,000 from \$58,300,000, respectively.
