FROST IN MAINE.—The staple crop of Ansonia, Me., is just coming above the ground. To preserve the crops from the late frosts people covered them with earth. Around Houlton last week, quite large areas of potatoes were frozen, causing the owners a heavy loss. These potatoes, it is said, were six inches high and would have been in the market by the fourth of July.

FOR STEALING LIQUOR.—Henry McEwen, Norman Valley, Maran Cummings, William Mahar and Henry Wakefield, were arraigned at the police court this morning charged with entering the warehouse of W. W. Clark, on Pease's No. 1 wharf, on three separate occasions, and stealing therefrom twenty-four flasks of whisky and six bottles of brandy. After hearing what a verbal witness had to say about the matter the case was adjourned until Monday next, for further evidence. Messrs. A. A. McLean and James H. Good appeared as counsel for some of the prisoners.

FOREST FIRES.—All the forests along the line of the Lake St. John (Quebec) railway appear doomed to almost total destruction unless rain falls shortly. From the terminus of the railway at Roberval on the shore of Lake St. John to Lake St. Joseph, about 25 miles from Quebec, there is one connected belt of fire, which seems to be sweeping onward through the whole region. All the woods in the parts surrounding Lake St. John are also on fire. Some farm houses are said to have been destroyed, but loss of life is not reported. Forest fires are also doing considerable damage in some parts of New Brunswick.

"Under the Palms."—Mr. S. U. Farnham, who has been engaged in rendering Robt's beautiful cantata, "Under the Palms," throughout the province of Nova Scotia with great success, is in Charlottetown for the purpose of organizing a chorus of 200 voices to render the same here. LAST SAD RITES.

SIR JOHN MACDONALD'S

Funeral at Kingston.

THE ISLANDERS PRESENT.

GRAVE WILL BE GUARDED

OTTAWA, June 12.

The final scene in the great national calamity ended yesterday at Kingston, when the body of Sir John A. Macdonald was borne to the tomb.

It was after midnight of Wednesday when the casket arrived and was carried to the City Hall, where it was deposited beneath the estafalque. Then commenced a steady stream of people, which continued all night and until noon yesterday.

Special trains were arriving all night bringing thousands of people.

City Hall was heavily draped inside and outside and all business was suspended. Every building along the line of march was draped.

At 2 o'clock the vast cavalcade formed into line. It was, however, impossible to thoroughly organize the procession on account of the multitude present, so that it was composed principally of societies and representatives. Deputations of Masons, Orangemen, Prentice Boys, True Blues, Foresters, Catholic Foresters, Oddfellows, St. Patrick's Society, Young Irishmen, English and Scotch societies, United Workmen, police and military all walked in the same procession.

Archbishop Cleary and chaplain occupied prominent positions. There were delegations present from British Columbia, the Northwest, the Grand Trunk Railway, the Canadian Pacific Railway, and the Reform Association of Brockville.

Cataraque Cemetery, where the burial took place, is three miles out of Kingston. The grave was dug eight feet deep, with a hollow square of solid masonry at the bottom. This receptacle is eight feet long, four feet wide and three feet deep. Into this the casket was lowered, and covered with immense slabs of sandstone eight inches thick, fastened with stout iron bolts, to guard against molestation.

When the body was being placed in the grave a slight rainstorm came on, accompanied with thunder and lightning, lasting, however, only a short time.

A guard of artillery will watch the grave for thirty days.

The following Islanders went to Kingston.—Senators Montgomery and Macdonald, John Yeo, Austin McDonald, John McLean and W. C. DesBrisay.

Joseph Pope was one of the chief mourners.

OTTAWA, June 12.

This morning's Citizen, Government organ, speaking semi-officially, says that Sir Charles Tupper is the man for Premier, if he will accept. The Citizen is of opinion that a provisional Prime Minister, as suggested by some, would be a public proclamation of weakness.

Shooting at Bedford Range.

Nova Scotia's Team Wins.

HALIFAX, June 12.

The sixth annual shooting competition for the Maritime Provinces took place at Bedford Range yesterday. The Nova Scotia team won with a total of 662, the New Brunswick representatives taking second place with 636, and the Islanders third with 630. The Islanders led at the 500 range, amid great excitement. Captain Bishop of the Nova Scotia team, led with a total of 97 points. R. V. Longworth of the Island team made 92 points.

The first of the series of inter-maritime matches was shot at Moncton, the second at Charlottetown, the third at Halifax, the fourth at St. John, the fifth at Charlottetown, and the sixth at Halifax. The trophy has up to the present been captured alternately by the teams from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Ministers Expelled.
