

Agencies to Seek Housing Project

Prospects of the welfare agencies entering the housing field seem hopeful with the decision last night to form a committee to study the possibilities of construction of low rental housing under the limited dividend loans of the National Housing Act.

A public meeting, sponsored by the Catholic Welfare Bureau of the Charlottetown, St. Vincent's Nurses' Residence, and chaired by bureau chairman, W. A. Murray, discussed the long-unsolved question of providing housing for the low income group. Taking part were panel composed of R.F. Gagne, Co-chairman Dr. John Craig of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, A.E. Belliveau, vice-president of the P.E.I. Housing Commission and J.E. Douglas, provincial director of social planning.

Members of the Catholic and Protestant welfare bureaus, the P.E.I. Housing Commission, and others will be asked to participate in this committee to study the feasibility of housing for the group with income under \$2,000.

Mayor A. Walten Gaudet extended to a group of listeners at St. Joseph's church a bureau to concentrate on this income group. The City of Charlottetown would follow in the field of a higher income group following the report of provincial low income survey, which is expected in June, he said.

SUM POCKETS
It was said, he said, that Mr. De Silva's report would show the presence of sum pockets in the city. The matter of proceeding into municipal housing is a business project, he pointed out, requiring a payment of adequate rents which this low income group could not cope with. How could they meet the minimum payments? Municipal housing would be based on the income of the group in co-operative housing as described by Mr. Douglas.

The meeting discussed both the limited dividend loans under section 43 of the National Housing Act and the federal-provincial housing and land assembly of section 44 of the National Housing Act. The problems involved in the proposal to provide housing for the low income group in the general discussion. Others said that health and fire insurance could be provided for the low income group as the people occupying structures were not doing so.
