The debate on this question was long and spirited and while it may have at times travelled quite far afield it did serve to emphasize the interest which exists in the potato industry. Not all the resolutions introduced were debated as much as their importance warranted but it is interesting to note that the meeting generally agreed that a system of deficiency payment should be considered as a means of providing price support for the potato industry.

A question not strictly of an agricultural nature but one of importance to farmers is the proposed hospital insurance plan which was outlined by Mr. John Ledgerwood, administrator of the Prince County Hospital. Mr. Ledgerwood pointed out that while approximately 60 per cent of the cost of the hospital is covered by the provincial share it is likely to increase substantially as the years go by.

### AMONG THE FARMERS

Federation of Agriculture Newsletter

**PRICE SPREADS**  
Wednesday's announcement that the government had set up a Price Spread Commission will be noted with particular interest by farmers who are becoming increasingly concerned with the great difference between what the farmer gets and what the consumer pays. The Canadian Federation of Agriculture is represented on the Commission by one of its directors in the person of Mr. Romeo Martin.

Howard MacKichan has at various times been connected with farm organizations and his son Ralph presently represents the Maritimes on the Executive of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture. Dr. Drummond is correctly listed as chairman of National Farm Radio Forum.

It is apparently very easy to produce a surplus of almost any farm product in this country. This probably explains the caution exercised at different levels in applying price supports at any level that will encourage over-production. Price support which is applied generally across the country may be profitable in one area and constitute a loss in another.

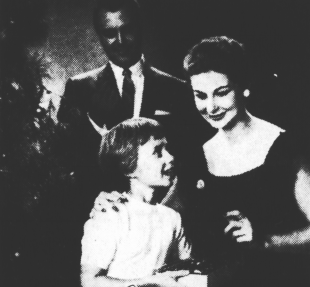
Further the efficient producer may do very well at a given price while the inefficient one will operate at a loss. Added to this is the fact that price supports during the last six months has been a strong recommendation of the C.F.A. price support should be considered as a necessary and important part of

any price support system. The C.F.A. policy calls for price support to be applied on a mandatory basis on cheese, butter, concentrated milk products, eggs, poultry meat and bacon hogs.

There should, of course, in addition be provision made for applying price supports and deficiency payments on most other farm commodities when required. The C.F.A. has also requested that insofar as possible that price supports should be at the producer level rather than at the trade as is presently the case with eggs.

**PRICE COUNTY MEETINGS**  
In spite of difficult driving conditions the annual meeting of the Prince County Federation of Agriculture was well attended and there was no reluctance on the part of those present to take part in discussion on matters related to potato organization, potato marketing, unemployment insurance, and other matters related to farm problems. 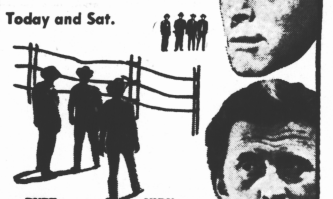
