

SWIMMER DIES

MONTREAL (CP) — Harry E. Jacobs, 46, president of the Canadian Water Polo Association and an officer of the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association, died Wednesday night following a handball session at the YMCA. Mr. Jacobs was stricken by a heart seizure while resting before going to the showers. He had been employed at the T. Eaton Company in Montreal for the last 29 years.

Revamping Solar System Is Proposed By Scientist

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Revamping the solar system to create a hundred new planets with a climate like Earth's was proposed Thursday by a noted astrophysicist as a way of solving humanity's biggest problem—overpopulation.

Dr. Fritz Zwicky, California Institute of Technology rocket expert, told a reporter that such a project is within the realm of possibility.

Zwicky envisions scooping up great portions of the major planets, such as Jupiter, and Neptune, and transferring them to smaller planets and their satellites—then changing the orbits of the enlarged planets to make their course around the sun roughly comparable to that of our Earth.

All this can be accomplished, the scientist said, through proper use of the energies released by man's new weapon against the cosmos—the explosion of the atom.

"The greatest problem man faces here on earth," he said, "is overpopulation, with its accompanying economic and political problems.

"There are far too many of us now and it will be even worse in the future... the answer to this problem is virtually within our grasp if we would only seize it."

"We have a problem of segregation of races. Some races just don't seem to get along with each other. What could be simpler than segregating these races on other planets?"

Increasing the size of the moon, Zwicky said, would increase its

gravitational pull to a point where it could build up and retain an atmosphere similar to that of earth.

The scientist was reluctant to explain just how great masses of material could be transferred from one planet to another.

"I could tell you," he said, "but it would take three weeks to make it clear. But if we can move planets, we certainly could move parts of planets, couldn't we?"

Dr. Zwicky also has thought about the kind of ship necessary to carry men from one planet to another. Such a ship could be built within 10 years or so, he said, if enough money, say \$100,000,000, were made available for research of the type he now is doing.

The space ship would travel indefinitely on fuel it collects in transit. This fuel would be the
