'T' WAS A GREAT SUCCESS.—The recent jubilee bazaar in Moncton netted over \$1,800. The bazaar was under the auspices of St. Bernard's Church.

ISLANDERS DINE.—The first annual dinner of the Prince Edward Island Club is to be given at the United States Hotel, Boston, this evening.

CONCERT.—The opening concert of the regular winter course of entertainments at St. Peter's Hall is duly advertised in our issue today, and promises to be an unusually good event. Mr. Vinnicombe's splendid orchestra and individual talented members of it furnish two thirds of the evening's entertainment, and this alone marks the programme as of a high order. Other favorites furnish readings and solos. A perusal of the programme will probably attract a large audience on the 19th inst., to this favorite place of high class entertainment.

SPARRING EXHIBITION.—There will be a sparring exhibition in the Lyceum tonight at 8 o'clock. The principal event will be an 8-round bout between Charles Farrell, the well known heavy-weight of Boston, who was formerly sparring partner of Fitzsimmons, and Charles Dunning, of this province. Mr. Farrell is well known throughout the United States and has fought draws with Jim Corbet, Choyinski, Maher and Geo. Godfrey. Mr. Dunning has met several of the best men in Maine and New Hampshire and has defeated Muldoon's Pickens and battled to a draw with Billy Hennessy. There will be three other bouts.

THINKS HE HAS A GOOD ACTION.—A Moncton lawyer, who rides a wheel, thinks he has a good action for damages against a prominent hardware firm. Early in the season he purchased a new wheel, and, as he thought, a bottle of bicycle oil. The other day he discovered that instead of the bicycle oil the dealer had given him a sort of lacquering fluid that is rubbed on the outside of guns, where it hardens and protects the barrel. He now has his wheel apart and is trying to remove the stuff, which he finds in hard lumps where there should be nothing but the slickest kind of oil. The limb of the law has travelled 500 miles on that wheel and he thinks he has a good action against the merchant for surplus energy expended in propelling it—say 2,500 miles at the legal rate, 10 cents, a mile, or \$250.

GOLD STOLEN.—Between 7 and 8 o'clock last night a burglar entered the dental rooms of Dr. Bagnall, on the corner of Queen and Richmond streets, and stole about \$15 worth of gold from one of the drawers. The burglar entered the place very boldly, lighting the gas and proceeding to make himself at home. He was observed by Mr. Arthur Dillon, who gave the alarm. But before the burglar could be captured he made his escape, it is believed through the front window. The same evening the dental rooms of Dr. Ayers were also entered and ab at \$9 worth of gold stolen. The two thefts were evidently the work of the same individual, who is looked upon as one of the cleverest thieves that ever struck Charlottetown. He is described as a man of medium size, dressed in grey clothes. The police and citizens generally would do well to be on the lookout for him.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

NOVA SCOTIA EXHIBITION.—The exhibition at Halifax closed on Tuesday. The total attendance for the seven days was 61,000, and there were 30,000 paid admission to the grand stand. Still there will be a deficit of about \$2,000.

EVANGELISTIC.—Mr. Gale's meeting in Zion Church was better attended last night than it has been on any previous night except Sunday night, when the church was overcrowded. He spoke earnestly and forcibly from the words "The Master is come and cometh for Thee." Mr. Greenwood sang two solos "God is Coming" and "Must I go and empty handed must I meet my Saviour so; not one sheaf with which to greet Him must I empty handed go." The interest in these meetings is growing as seen from the fact that when Mr. Gale called for a second meeting more than two thirds of the large audience stayed. The meetings will be continued in Zion Church tonight at 7.30.

STOLE A WATCH.—Allan Butler, said to be an Islander, stole a watch from the cabin of the schr. Jennie Armstrong, at Chatham, N. B., and was sent to jail for three months. The other day, two months and two days after his sentence, John Bauthier had a watch stolen from him at Bridgetown, and Butler who had appeared there the day before, disappeared at the same time as the watch. The police have been on the lookout for him. The authorities did not understand how he got out of jail at the end of two months when he had been sentenced for three, but have since learned that he escaped.

ACCIDENTALLY DROWNED.—We hear with regret that Mrs. Charles Stewart, of Union Road, was accidentally drowned on Tuesday afternoon. The accident occurred in a small brook near the residence of the deceased. It seems that Mrs. Stewart had not been in her usual health for a time past, being subject to weak turns. When she felt one of these weak spells coming on she would bathe her face in water. The supposition is that Mrs. Stewart was walking near the brook and feeling herself growing weak sought to bathe her face in the water, and falling in was drowned. There was not enough water to cover the back of her head. Mrs. Stewart was buried this afternoon. She leaves a husband and six children to mourn. Mr. Stewart was in Charlottetown at the time of the accident.
