Hints to Farmers.

Breed from thoroughbred stock only.

Don't stint the cattle if you want to raise heavy beefs for the English markets.

Make provision for the watering of your stock during the warm weather.

The early sown turnips must be kept clear of weeds. If the black fly appears, sprinkle with lime or plaster.

Don't let the caterpillars increase. They show by their webs where they are, crush them out, at first sight or they will do much damage.

Sprinkle the plant lice which you may see on the tops of cherry trees and other fruit trees, with tobacco water—they can't stand it.

Bands of stiff paper around the tree smeared with tar will keep down the canker-worm.

One drop of sulphuric acid on the heart of a stubborn weed or plantain will seal its doom.
