Speaker Pick making his first start in two years has been training well and looks as though he is back in his old form. Timmy H. and Estralia C. have both showed well in their previous starts this year. Grand R. and Yankee Blaze if they show their last year's style will be the horses to beat.

Races 2 and 6 bring together Doc Wilson, Caparatay, Sunny Key, Gary T. Adios, Tea Time Gal, Kid Freight, Magic Charm, and David P.H. — a mixture of young, up and coming horses with seasoned veterans. Voice Of Habs Expounds Views

Danny Gallivan, Voice of the Montreal Habs, Dean of the hockey announcers, spoke last night.

This observer was fortunate enough to have a discussion with Mr. Gallivan last evening about the current situation in the National Hockey League and naturally the conversation strayed around to the topic of what effect expansion will play on the league.

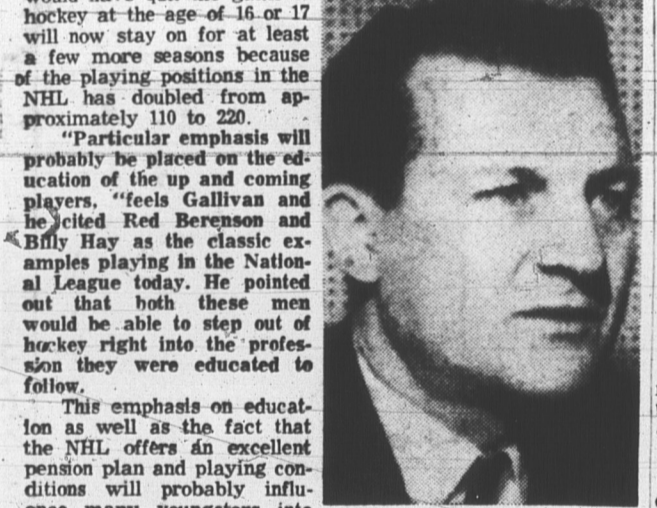
When queried about the various factors which will be noticed by the masses, Gallivan put particular emphasis on the farm systems that the new entries will have to develop. "Look behind any championship club," stated Gallivan, "and you will discover a great farm system."

"The fact that these new clubs do not have good farm teams now is bound to hurt them in the beginning," he went on to say, but also added that the farm clubs were the key to success.

Gallivan feels that the new six teams are bound to make a great dent in organized hockey as it stands. He feels that "Young fellows who once would have quit the game of hockey at the age of 16 or 17 will now stay on for at least a few more seasons because of the playing positions in the NHL has doubled from approximately 110 to 220."

"Particular emphasis will probably be placed on the education of the up and coming players," feels Gallivan and he cited Red Berenson and Billy Hay as the classic examples playing in the National League today. He pointed out that both these men would be able to step out of hockey right into the professions if they were educated to follow.

This emphasis on education as well as the fact that the NHL offers an excellent pension plan and playing conditions will probably influence many youngsters into taking a serious crack at the "National Game."

Perhaps I should not be talking about our National game for conversation both with Gordie Howe and Gallivan emphasis was put on the fact that the United States is playing an increasing role in the game of Hockey. Gallivan was particularly enthusiastic and buoyant when on the subject of the colored telecasts of the Stanley Cup finals and it was with interest that this observer learned from Howe that the first televised hockey game ever on a national network in the U.S. had a higher audience rating than the Masters and the National Basketball Association finals for the first hour. After that it is no wonder fans turned to the more familiar games because by that time the Detroit Red Wings were well on their way to their 7-0 triumph over the Black Hawks.

Howe pointed out that there is no Junior hockey in Detroit itself as of now but he felt quite certain that his two sons, both of whom are members of the Detroit Roster-tails Pee Wee Club which played in the Quebec International Pee Wee Tourney, would be able to play in a Junior bracket by the time they had reached that age bracket.

Both Gallivan and Howe feel that new Junior leagues will be opened up in assorted Canadian and U.S. towns and cities and it is from these new sources that the majority of players are going to be taken by the new clubs in the National Hockey League.

JUST WHO IS BIASED?

Following the banquet, both Gallivan and Howe were mobbed by various dignitaries and souvenir fans and one of the questions which was thrown at Gallivan was that of the fact that many people felt he was biased in his reports on the games. Did he agree? Danny deftly fielded this query by pointing out that the majority of his accusers were cheering for the other team anyway and that if the Canadiens did manage to score a goal he was criticized as being biased just for describing the play. It was the other person who was prejudiced.

Dodgers Outlaw Chicago; Atlanta Hammers Mets

CHICAGO (AP) — Jim LeFebvre's 12th home run and a routine fly by Al Ferrara, which went for a homer when two Cubs collided, gave Los Angeles Dodgers an 8-6 10-inning victory over Chicago Cubs Tuesday.

Left fielder Byron Browne and shortstop Don Kessinger crashed going after Ferrara's soaring fly ball in the 10th after LeFebvre hit his homer.

As Ferrara circled the bases for his second home run of the game, the two players lay prone on the field.

Kessinger remained in the game, but Carl Wacwick went in for Browne.

The extent of Browne's injuries was not known.

John Roseboro's lead-off homer in the eighth inning for the Dodgers pushed the game into a 6-6 deadlock.

NEW YORK (AP) — Joe Torre's three-run homer climaxed a seven-run explosion in the fifth inning that powered Atlanta Braves to an 11-6 victory over New York Mets Tuesday night.

The victory was the fourth straight for the Braves after a seven game losing streak.

Atlanta scooted the Mets five runs in the first three innings before roaring from behind in the fifth.

Torre's homer was his 14th. Jerry Grote and Al Luplow cracked run-scoring singles and Cleon Jones scored on the front end of a double steal in the Mets' first. They boosted their lead to 3-0 in the third on Dick Stuart's two-run homer.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Jim Bunning checked Cincinnati out three hits for his eighth straight victory as Philadelphia defeated the Reds 5-1 Tuesday night.

Bunning, who has lost only once, was aided by Bill White's two-run inside-the-park homer in the first inning and Cookie Rojas' homer in the seventh.

The big right hander struck out 14 and walked none.

It was the Phils' eighth victory in the last nine games and 11th in the last 13.

Actually it was two misjudged fly balls by Deron Johnson in the first inning that enabled the Phils to score three runs against loser Milt Pappas, bow 4-4.

Sunny Key Wins Double At Charlottetown Races

Sunny King owned by Blois and Norman MacPhail of Cornwall stepped a mile in 2:10.3, fastest time of the night, before 300 cheering fans at the Charlottetown Driving Park last night. The Mighty Sun gelding driven by Walter Craig, charged from the backfield going up the backstretch both times to win going away in the times of 2:11 and 2:10.3.

Captain Chief, with Joe Hennessey up and Chum, with Clarke Smith up, split the honors in the featured 5th and 9th dashes of the night.

In the 5th dash Hennessey guided Captain Chief to top at the eight pole and the black gelding fought off a determined stretch bid by Tommie B. Council to win in the time of 2:15.

In the 9th dash Captain Chief once again grabbed the top spot but Clark Smith eased Chum in to the "two hole" and the six-year-old chestnut mare did the rest in winning at the wire in the time of 2:12.2.

All races had the fans on their feet as the horses pounded down the stretch in very exciting races. Fans hardly had time to sit in their seats when Bob's Girl, with Bobby Craig up, nipped Josedale Co-Pilot at the wire, to return lucky ticket holders \$17.20 for a \$2 win bet, and set up a first daily double payoff of \$70.80. Time of the mile was 2:15.3 which was a new race record for the six-year-old chestnut mare.
