

Marciano Will Defend Championship April 10

NEW YORK, (AP)—Rocky Marciano will defend his world heavy-weight title against ex-champion Jersey Joe Walcott, Friday, April 10, at Chicago Stadium in a 15-round rematch that will be televised.

Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, made the announcement after a conference

with a lawyer for ailing Felix Boccia, manager of the 39-year-old Walcott. Each fighter will get 30 per cent. There will be no rematch agreement.

"I think the bout should draw over a million dollars, counting television," said Norris. "We will ask the Illinois Athletic Commission to let us set a \$50,000."

Umpire Declares Musial Tough To Call At Plate

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Stan Musial of St. Louis Cardinals, baseball's greatest hitter, also is the toughest to umpire behind.

Take it from one of the men in blue, Ralph Babe Pinelli. He's the second oldest umpire, in point of service, in the National League and ready to begin his 19th year. Only Bill Stewart antedates him.

"Musial is the hardest man in the league to umpire behind," Pinelli said Tuesday. "The reason is he stands so far from the plate. He takes his stance in the extreme outside corner of the box.

"That means the umpire has to concentrate completely on the plate. And that plate is mighty small when a pitcher is firing a fast one or breaking a hook across a corner."

Roccos Horushe, who hit 400 or better for the Cardinals three different seasons, was the right-handed prototype of Musial.

"I think Musial is not only the greatest hitter in either league but also the greatest all-round player. That takes in running, throwing and thinking as well as hitting. And he has the finest disposition of any player I have dealt with. He never looks for any favors or

a break."

Pinelli became a National League umpire in 1935, after two years in the Pacific Coast League. As a third baseman for Chicago White Sox, Detroit and Cincinnati, Pinelli was one of the scrappiest players in the game.

He would charge the umpires if he thought they had missed a call and he would swing his dukes any time a rival player challenged him.

He seldom ejects a player. "I've never forgotten that I was once a player and that many times a player has a legitimate gripe."

In the Francois Jobin competition the A. L. Papefuss rink from Wausau, Wis., defeated F. R. McLaine's Charlottetown rink 13-5.

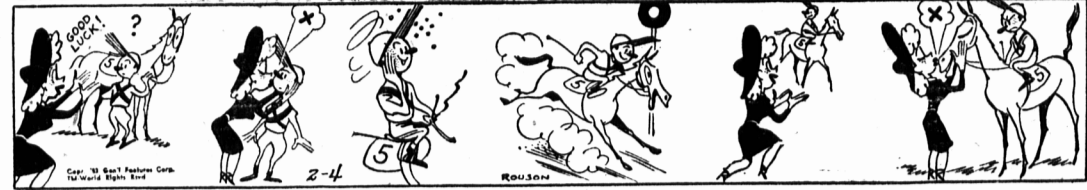

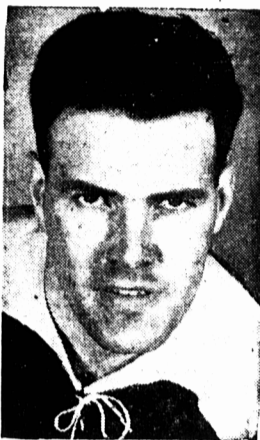
