Oldtimers will remember her quite well. She had a world of speed but was hard to get away. Jack Irving had about the best success with her owner Reg Sterns. . . . Visiting Myron McArthur's stable, the beautiful chestnut stallion Russell Hanover 2.08 1/2 was led out for inspection and showed off to perfection. He is 10 years old and has won over \$7,000 on the trot. He will be in the stud this season.

Horsemen in Kensington were predicting great things for the 3 year old by Abner T. Clegg, out of Mae Win, bred by William Proffitt to J. H. DeWitt of Woodstock, N.B. They think Mr. DeWitt will have another June Morning 2.04 3/4. Keith Boswell of Victoria also had a sale to W. M. Styles of Woodstock, N.B. this time a filly by Abner T. Clegg, dam Symbol M. by Symbol Flegg. . . . At Harrington Percy called on Allison Carr and admired his four year old Calumet Budlong 2.02 1/2, out of Daisy Set by Kalmuck 2.15 1/2 which will be raced over the ice this winter. . . . Another likely prospect at Harrington is a four-year-old by Playdale E. G. dam Miss Jane Arden by Kalmuck 2.15 1/2. He has trained in £23 for owner George McKay.

Douglas MacDonald of Cornwall proudly took the blankets off and showed a yearling by Playdale E. G. dam Betty L. Budlong, and a five-months-old out of Betty. They are owned by Charles Sutherland of Sydney, N.S. who is manager of the Thompson and Sutherland hardware stores. The five-months foal is by Kalmuck 2.15 1/2 by Peter the Great and is the last foal sired by him. In 1949 at the age of 32 he was bred to seven mares and there are six living foals from him. This is believed to be a world record for a harness horse progenitor. The Kalmuck baby is fat and sleek as a mouse and will be an excellent sire. . . . Let us have something to say about other aged sires but nothing as startling as the above. Now let us take a look at Betty L. Budlong that had her moment of real greatness at Bue Acres track, New Glasgow, N.S., August 3rd, 1946. The event was the 2.30 class stake, promoted by David Néma, proprietor of the track. The purse totaled \$3,040, one of the largest stakes ever raced for in the Maritimes. Betty L. Budlong was a straight heat winner, Baldwin G 4-2-2, Lock Hanover 6-9-4, Jean Budlong 8-3-3, Alpha Hal 6-4-5, Buddy Budlong 7-5-7, Money Maker 5, 10, 6, Goldie Duds 11-6-9, Duke of Hyland 10-7-8, Talugi 3-8-dr., Mayne Axworthy 8-dr. Time 2.12 1/2, 2.15 1/2, 2.13. The owner of Betty was Walter Thompson of Halifax. But if memory serves right Charles Sutherland led the mare the night before the race. It was a stunner of a contest with everybody going away on high to secure a good position. Several of the above pacers have gone on to fast records, notably Lock Hanover 2.07 3/8, Money Maker 2.08, Talugi 2.10, Mayne Axworthy 2.12.

Edwin Duffy prominent farmer of Village Green recently purchased a valuable brood mare sired by Kalmuck 2.15 1/2 and intends breeding her to one of our outstanding sires. . . . We have received a very complimentary letter from the well-known race horse owner John H. Reed, of Fairfield, Maine, which concludes with "I raced at Woodstock, N.B., winning with Our Scott 2.05 1/4. It has always been a pleasure to race on your Canadian tracks." Years ago the Reed stable with driver Monte Gerow was among the most popular visitors here during Provincial Exhibition meetings.

P.W.C. Wins Exhibition Hockey Game At Halifax From King's College Squad

HALIFAX, Jan. 26 (Special)—Five goals by sharpshooting Phillip Jardine paved the way to a 6-1 victory for Prince of Wales College over King's College in a rough and ready exhibition hockey match played at Dalhousie rink last night. . . . Coming from behind a 1-0 lead set up by Kings in the first period, Jardine banged home his first marker for P. W. C. to deadlock the score at 3:36 of the second period that lasted to the end of the frame. Going wide-open in the closing session, four more goals by Jardine and one by Gillis without a reply from the opposition wrapped up the game for the Welshmen. . . . It was a rousing match that saw 21 penalties being handed out, including a misconduct and match misconduct to Clark of P. W. C. and majors to Woodhead against Kings and Gillis of P. W. C. After numerous flare-ups in the first and second periods, things got really hot in the final frame when a free-for-all broke out that involved practically every player on both teams. . . . Scoring the only first period goal, Williams scored Kings lone marker at 13:28 on an assist from Skinner while Robert Murphy, an Island boy, was one of the outstanding players on the Kings College team. Gillis and coalle Simmons were also very effective

HUNTERS' CORNER

Ring-necked pheasants were first introduced into this province during the 1st Great War—1917 was the year I believe—34 years ago. I was overseas at the time and remember getting the story when I returned home in May, 1919. . . . My uncle, the late William Jenkins, Seal River, had secured a shipment from his son Max then living in Kelowna in the Okanagan Valley, British Columbia. They made a splendid showing the first year but a severe winter wiped out the entire crop with the exception of the old Cock bird. . . . A few years later more pheasants were purchased in Ontario but they fared no better than the B. C. product. In the late 1920's the late J. D. Jenkins, Charlifetown, bought some adult pheasants and kept them in wire pens. The eggs were gathered and distributed to interested farmers. I was living on a farm at Mount Albion at the time and raised 15 under a couple of Leghorn hens. . . . It was the same story. A number of Cock birds held out for some years but our winters seemed to be too severe for the hens. The late W. H. Dennis, then Minister of Agriculture, decided in the early 1930's to take a hand. He arranged a trade with authorities in Fredericton, N. B. whereby Hungarian partridge were live trapped and exchanged for pheasants. These were supposed to be a hardy strain more adapted to our severe Maritime winters. . . . I do not remember the exact number of pheasants brought to the province from Fredericton but have recollection of assisting in distributing sixty odd Cock birds and hens. 18 were set free at the boundary line of Southport and Alexandria at the rear of the farm of the late J. H. (Jim Hen) Judson. This planting slow Quebec which were hatched in incubators and raised to near maturity before being distributed to different sections of the province—Kings, Queens, and Prince Counties. The bulk of the birds thus raised and liberated seemed to vanish into thin air and no appreciable increase was noted in the Island pheasant population. . . . After this attempt proved unsuccessful Island Pheasants Unlimited was organized and pheasants were imported wholesale from the States. . . . I believe was the point of origin if my memory serves me correctly. They were purchased in lots of 400 and better and a heavy re-stocking program was instituted. . . . On the whole the results did not appear to justify the effort and expense, not at the beginning at any rate. The pheasant population would show promising signs of taking hold and increasing and then would come along a severe winter just as it seemed the time was ripe for an open season. . . . Finally an open season of one week was set with a bag limit of 3 Cock birds per season. It was felt that if the birds were going to die during the winter sportsmen who were responsible for their presence should at least be given a chance to bag a few before King Winter took his toll.
