THE LIBERALS AND PROHIBITION.

How cruelly misled and disappointed the leaders of the Prohibition movement have been need not be stated. Liberals throughout the country share with Conservatives the disgust which is felt concerning the Government's conduct. Representative Liberals in Parliament sought to break the Government's fall in this regard by proposing Provincial Prohibition and bringing the matter before the House of Commons. Mr. Bell, of East Prince supported the motion and, we are told, "made a long and somewhat involved argument in defence of the course of the Government. He held that the ministers were perfectly justified in refusing prohibition, dwelling particularly upon the adverse vote of Quebec. He also invented the fresh excuse that the Government knew if they brought in a prohibitory bill the Senate would throw it out. This produced some amusement, as it was apparent to every member of the house that the government would have been only too glad to have such a bill thrown out by the senators and thus have escaped the responsibility for both the enactment and the refusal of the measure."

Mr. McLure, of Colchester, moved an amendment in favor of the passage of a Federal prohibitory law. Then to save the Liberals from going on record, Mr. Parmelee, the Liberal member for Sheford, moved a further amendment, which stated that the result of the plebiscite has shown that there is not an active prohibition seatment sufficiently pronounced to justify the expectation that a prohibitory law should be passed. The fact of three different motions emanating from three different Liberal members showed what a happy family sits to the right of Mr. Speaker! Then, to cap the climax, Mr. Lamieux, on the suggestion of the Premier moved the adjournment of the debate, which carried—and the question is settled, so far as this session is concerned.

It is perhaps, worthy of remark, that Mr. Moore, of Stanstead, one of the leading members of the Dominion Alliance, took the strongest possible ground against Provincial prohibition. "He objected to it on general principles, and in particular because that portion of Quebec in which he lived was strongly in favor of prohibition. Under Mr. Flint's scheme it would be absolutely shut out from all hopes of checking the liquor traffic for a generation to come. Mr. Moore gave some interesting information in regard to the Quebec vote, quoting the results in a number of polls, where out of a hundred to one hundred and fifty registered voters, the ballots cast were in some cases within three or four of the total number, and in some cases larger than the total number on the list. He gave a list of a dozen polls or thereabouts, in which the vote recorded was 1,330 out of a possible 1,357, which of course must have been a fraudulent vote.

CROP CONDITIONS.

Crops throughout this Province continue to look well. Farmers have had "catchy" weather for hay making; but a great deal of hay has been saved in fairly good. There are some fears that rust will again strike the wheat, the conditions favoring it. But we hope for the best. The prospect, just now, is splendid.
