Don't mind that I said to Mr. Owen that I did not carry it for Howell. I carried it for the damned French. If the French molested me I said I had a weapon and I would defend myself with it. I heard Owen state yesterday that I carried a knife, but it was not true. I swear it was not true. When the French lived down there they tore down my garden fence, broke in my house, etc. I had a gun and one time I fired in the air. They never teased Howell. They broke into his house. Mary Blackmore stayed at my house two nights, when she was staying with Joe Arsenault.

Counsel—Why did you not send her home! Witness—Was I going to turn her out! I did not go at Howell with a knife in Wilson's barn when he struck me with a rake. I never said a word to him. We walked home together good friends.

THE EVIDENCE OF WILLIAM ABBATT. WILLIAM ABBATT, (sworn)—Examined by the Attorney-General.—I live in Malpeque. I know the prisoner, and knew the deceased. I had a conversation with the prisoner about his fences before the shooting. He told me he would lay in wait and shoot the Wallace's. If they would take his poles, I said, Roderick you should not do that, and he said he would as quick as he would shoot a dog; or anyone else that he caught taking the poles. The place where the shooting took place was pointed out to me on the evening following. I saw a track in McGowan's field.

Cross-examined by Mr. Hodgson.—I know the prisoner for eight or ten years. He was complaining before the shooting, of people stealing his longers, and he was threatening what he would do. He did not mention any one in particular. He would shoot anyone who would touch the longers. I saw Henry Wallace at Kensington the day of the shooting. We were talking about a horse. We had no drink there. We could not get one.

GEORGE RAMSAY'S TESTIMONY. GEORGE RAMSAY examined by the Attorney-General.—I live at Malpeque. I know the prisoner and knew the deceased. I saw Wallace the evening before the shooting and also the night he was shot. He had no hopes of getting better. He said he was all shot away. He also said he heard a voice, and he went to reason with him. He did not know Howell had a gun until he got so near that he could not escape. He said he hoped the Lord would forgive Howell as he did. He would rather be in his own position than in Howell's. I got to Wallace's about five o'clock the morning after the shooting. Henry showed me the place when Howell stood. The snow was deep where Howell stood. He also showed where Wallace fell after being shot. There was a little blood there. He also pointed out Howell's tracks. Between where Howell stood and Wallace fell the snow was hard. Howell stood on a bank and the track appeared as if he had made one step forward and then another backward and went off.

Cross-examined by Mr. Hodgson.—The footsteps did not appear as if there had been a scuffle. There was nothing in the steps that would lead me to disbelieve that Howell made at Wallace with the gun when he was going towards him.

ALICE STUBSBURY was called on behalf of the Crown. The Attorney General informed the Court that this witness knew nothing about the case, and he merely called her because her name appeared on the back of the indictment; and for the purpose of tendering her for cross-examination. Mr. Hodgson said that, as she knew nothing, he had nothing to ask her.

EXAMINATION OF MILLIE SUBSBURY. MILLIE SUBSBURY (sworn)—Examined by the Attorney-General.—I know the prisoner in the dock. I live in Princetown, five or six yards from Howell's. I was at home the night of the shooting. I was in Howell's house also the night of the shooting. When the prisoner came home he said to me that he had a dreadful deed. I asked what he had done. He said he had shot William Wallace. I asked him if he was sorry for it. He said: "No; he wished he had shot both legs instead of one." His wife was the only one I saw in the house at the time. I went out and over to Wallace's. Dr. Keir, the women and Henry Wallace were there. William Wallace the deceased was in bed. I remained a little while.

Cross-examined by Mr. Hodgson.—I am no friend of Mary Blackmore. I worked two summers at the lobster factory. I was over at Howell's twice that night, and Tom Murphy was with me the second time. It was between eight and nine o'clock when I was there the first time. I heard Howell threatening often, but I did not mind him. To the Attorney-General—Howell also told Murphy about the shooting, but I do not know what it was.

The Court adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.
