OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's drug chief said Thursday the federal government must have to impose tight controls over distribution of certain tranquillizer drugs if there is evidence of a considerable increase in illegal trafficking in them. Dr. C. A. Morrell, head of the food and drug directorate, told the special Commons committee on drugs that the sale of tranquillizers is being watched carefully and the possibility of placing certain ones under special controls was being kept in mind.

Dr. Morrell expressed concern over the problem of advertising of food and drugs originating in the United States and made available in Canada on radio and television and in printed matter. He said the food and drug administration in Washington has not the same authority as the Canadian health department over advertising. It was a concern of a section of the U.S. trade department.

CONTROL GOFBALLS

R. C. Hammond, chief of the health department's narcotics control division, said new government controls on barbiturate use are being considered. A marked improvement in the situation concerning the sale of barbiturates is being achieved, he said. However, he told the committee that in the first seven months of 1962 the total number of fatalities attributed to use of barbiturates in Vancouver was 10, compared with 11 in the whole of 1961. The Canadian Federation is the final clearing house for the industry dealing with policy matters and originating during the past year. It has been a farm organization. Final approval or otherwise is vested in a delegate meeting of the directors and 54 delegates. Once approved by this body the CFA board and executive committee is authorized to proceed with the implementation of the resolutions. The 90 resolutions considered by the CFA meeting cover a wide range of matters, including every-day practical concerns to farmers, such as the marketing of produce, the handling of farm products, the construction of an additional ice-breaking car ferry for the
