

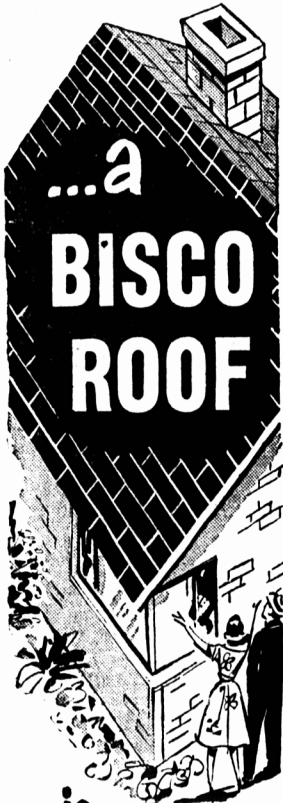
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W.C.T.U. NOTES

EARLY TASTE OF LIQUOR

Ice cream flavored with alcohol is being sold to English children.

"That's the way they get a taste for liquor," declared Mrs. H. Cecil Heath, when she gave her corresponding secretary's report at Wednesday afternoon's session of world W.C.T.U.

Then she maintained a well-made toy, a brewer's dray with a barrel on top.

"It's blatant advertising." Quick reviews of work in countries under the world organization were presented.

Mrs. Heath praised Canada's scientific temperance instruction courses and contests, and mentioned the narcotic education school on the prairies.

Relief for Korea had been sent by White Ribbon women all round the world. Already Mrs. Heath has sent \$440 to that stricken country, with another \$120 through the International Red Cross.

Because of illiteracy, people of Pakistan can only be reached by films, pictures or similar means.

First school for mentally-retarded children in the Near East was by Mrs. S. F. Jamali on Iraq.

Temperance progress has been made in Burma, though the schools and homes, the crusading spirit rising again in 1949.

Uphill work was reported from France, and hard restrictions experienced in Bulgaria.

Work is carried on through schools in Germany, and social work has been enlarged in Finland.

A children's hour and a forum for adults had been special features of a convention in Chile.

Students in Bermuda had entered Canada's essay contest, one winning a special award.

Band of Hope rally had been held in 1951 in British Guiana, and the churches of Belgium are trying to reform drinkers.

Japan has 19 districts and 160 local unions, with more than 1500 members. Australia has some 8000 members.

Mrs. H. C. Munns of Burlingame, Cal., presented the financial statement. It revealed grants made to 37 countries, and so far some \$2656 had gone for Korean relief.

There are 10 paid organizers working for the world W.C.T.U. Up to 4 p.m. Wednesday, there were 50 life members listed; Mrs. Munns hopes for 100 before the convention closes. Canada has made 37.

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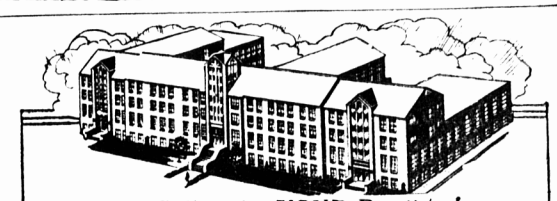
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Bristol and Vicinity
