SUMMERSIDE — There were two double dash winners on last night's nine dash racing program here. Little Art, a 6-year-old bay trotter owned by George Semple of Kensington and driven by Alyre Pineau, captured both dashes 3 and 7 over a field of seven other entries.

The gelding went the first mile in 2:12.2 and in his second lap, travelled the fastest mile of the night, 2:11.1.

The other double winner on the program was the Elm er Clow owned and driven Sunny Key. The 10-year-old brown gelding was first under the wire in both dashes 2 and 6 in identical miles of 2:12.1.

Other winners on the program were Sammy Gallon, Belle Texas, Tennessee Riley, Royal Hi Direct and Gennessus.

P.E.I. Track Team To Leave Today

The cream of Prince Edward Island's track and field crop leave today for Saint John, N.B., to compete in the Canadian Age Class Track and Field Championships. Under the guiding hand of Mr. David Boswell and Jack Kane the Islanders Track Club has come to be one of the strongest in the Maritimes as witnessed by high aggregate club honors in the Montreal Invitational meet and the Bill Haley Memorial Meet in Halifax.

Sprinter Billy MacKinnon, regarded by many to be the foremost sprinter in the Atlantic Provinces will be out to take Canadian honors in the 100, and 220 yard dashes. Another athlete highly favored to bring back honors is Andy Arsenault, national known mile and half miler, who is fresh from a victory over Chris Williamson in Halifax.

Gordon Bell is unable to attend the meet because of sickness but the Summerside midget flash Dave Bagloe is expected to show well. Other members on the mens team include Don Lohian, a 440 specialist, Bob Waugh well known Summerside pole vaulter, Jim Kirby and Chris Annett.

On the female squad are included Heather MacLean who could well win the juvenile girls high jump, Rhoda MacLeod, a threat in the broad jump, Fran Whitlock a weight specialist, Adele Marshbank who recently broke the N.S. women's open record and Jane Johnson and Jane Cash.

The meet is slated to begin tomorrow and continue through Saturday. Island results will be published in Saturdays Guardian.

Bill Crothers & Jerome Make Student Game Finals

BUDAPEST (CP-AP)—Randy Matson, a 260-pound Texan, and Olympic champion Mihaela Penes of Romania approached their world records Wednesday when they won gold medals in the men's shot put and women's javelin throw respectively at the World Student Games.

Their games-record performances highlighted the opening day of the track and field competition, in which Canada's Olympic stars, Bill Crothers of Markham, Ont., and Harry Jerome of Vancouver, easily qualified in their specialties.

Crothers reached the semi-finals of the 800 metres, winning his heat in a slow 1:52.0. George Germann of the U.S. led the qualifiers with a 1:50.3 clocking in his winning heat.

Crothers, runner-up to Peter Snell of New Zealand in the 1964 Olympic 800, was bothered by a muscle spasm before the race, but he said he felt fine afterward.

JEROME IN FINALS
Jerome raced two heats in the 100-metre dash and won both of them to reach the finals today. His time in the first heat was 10.6 seconds, but in the second he sped to a 10.3 clocking that equalled the games record set by defending champion Enrique Figueroa of Cuba.

Figueroa pulled a leg muscle in the heats and withdrew. George Anderson of the U.S. matched the games record also, winning his two heats in 10.3. Canada has one of the smallest teams in the games—only 10 men and women—and Crothers and Jerome are counted on heavily to win medals.

Despite the damp, cold weather, which he said bothered him, Matson won the shot put with a heave of 66 feet, 7 3/4 inches on his next-to-last toss. His best was about four feet short of his world mark of 70-7 set this spring.

Miss Penes, a 17-year-old, 204-pounder who stands six feet tall, took the women's javelin with a toss of 194 feet, 3 1/2 inches. Miss Penes, whose world record is 198-7 1/2, won the Olympic Gold Medal at Tokyo last October.

The U.S. has 11 gold medals, to lead in that department, with Hungary a close second with 10. Russia has only two gold medals.
