Eyes Wide Open States Campbell

Liberal Leader Alex Campbell, speaking at a meeting in the Montague Regional High School last night said, "the Liberal Party had gone into the pension system with 'our eyes wide open.'"

Mr. Campbell said, "we have known all along that Ottawa was prepared to pick up the tab for half of any supplementary payment made by the province and that this would be retroactive to the first of April."

"The Premier," Mr. Campbell said, "even had the audacity to imply that the retroactive feature had resulted from his own inquiry. 'I am amazed that the Premier should try to employ a political trick in which he uses our senior citizens as a foil for his political advantage.'"

"We could have told him," Mr. Campbell said, "because from the very outset we have known the financial commitment to the Island government would be approximately \$1,170,000, as of present conditions."
