## Day Training School Presents One-Act Christmas Play Sat.

In their first attempt at a short one-act Christmas play, the children of the Day Training School conducted by Miss Elizabeth Coyle showed clearly the effect of their teaching and their zealous acceptance of instruction. The school, which has a regular attendance of eight boys and two girls, has been operating since the spring of 1956 with encouraging success in an adjusted program designed to the extent of their capacity to learn.

About 60 relatives, friends and parents of the pupils witnessed the play which was staged in the hall of West Kent School on Saturday. The opening number "O Canada" was followed by the stage performance concluding with "Jingle Bells" and "Silent Night".

Miss Coyle in her words of welcome, gratefully acknowledged on behalf of the children, her assistant in training, Mrs. James Peake, and herself, the assistance received in preparing the show as presented. Special reference

was made of Mrs. Frank Walker who acted as prompter, Miss Eileen Doyle who sang the "Hallelujah" and Mrs. Fred Coyle, pianist.

A special thanks also to a busy Santa Claus who appeared on stage and later distributed gifts at an assembly in the class room, and received a "big hand" from the children.

Harry Morris and James Peake who arranged the stage setting and backdrop were also thanked. Guests and children heartily enjoyed the refreshments served at the conclusion of the entertainment.

The school is operated through the combined effort of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion and the provincial government. Children are admitted on the recommendation of the provincial mental health clinic, under Dr. M.N. Beck, child psychiatrist. Pius Smith, representing the Canadian Legion, is chairman of the special school committee.

One of the main issues to be determined by the Western side is when the negotiations should start. Informed quarters said the United States and Britain differ on this.

They said Britain, backed by Canada, would like negotiations to start before an East-West summit conference. This would enable the summit leaders to review the course of negotiations and try to resolve any major obstacles.

On the other hand, the United States has asked for time to complete a review of the disarmament problem.

Second, a communique to be issued today will contain a reference to European trade. This is widely expected to refer to arrangements associating Canada and the United States in some kind of trade framework designed to alleviate the present split caused by the formation of two separate European economic blocs - the six-nation common market and the British-led "Outer Seven" free trade association.

The new dredge, built by Sydney Engineering and Drydock Co. Ltd., and launched on Nov. 17 by Mrs. Clive Currie, will be turned over to the department today by Bruce Rossetti, president of the building firm.

The new dredge has a one cubic yard capacity dipper bucket and a 1 1/2 cubic yard clam shell and will work in co-ordination with two 60 cubic yard scows.

Capt. Malloch MacLean presently captain of the DPW No. 14 will command the new 90 foot DPW No. 10.

## CD School Is Objective

A school of civil defence on the provincial level will be started here as soon as organizational details can be worked out, Major Orin Simons, provincial civil defence co-ordinator, said Thursday at North Rustico.

Major Simons was attending a meeting in that centre at which Bert Blaquiere was appointed civil defence co-ordinator for the area. The largely attended meeting drew crowds from the entire section extending to New Glasgow. The appointment of Mr. Blaquiere was announced by James Gaudin, chairman of the village commissioners of North Rustico.

The guest speaker told of the implications of a nuclear war and described the danger from fallout and what steps might be taken by citizens to protect their families.

Mr. Blaquiere suggested formation of a planning and advisory committee to assist in organizing civil defence in the area with the group to be formed of presidents and secretaries of organizations.

Mrs. Loretta Doyle spoke briefly on the importance of fast organization as in the new type of warfare there would be little warning of attack and pointed out the advantages of preparation under good leadership.
