

Pair Remanded In Break Case

Two persons were remanded until Aug. 18 to set a date for trial when they appeared yesterday before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. in magistrate's court on charges of break, entry and theft.

The two, James MacCallum, 152 King Street, and Harry Wendell McGee, 253 Dorchester Street, were charged with break, entry and theft, into Belvedere Golf and Winter Club and theft of about \$25 and two bottles of rum, with total value in excess of \$50.

Two persons appeared on charges of operating motor vehicles while their abilities were impaired by alcohol.

One accused, Raymond Joseph MacIntyre of Cleveland, Ohio, was remanded with bail set at \$200. He was represented by Lester O'Donnell.

The other accused, Royce Chester MacFarlane of DeSable, pleaded not guilty to an impaired driving charge and was remanded to Sept. 8 to fix a date for trial. Gordon Tweedy represented the accused and also acted as counsel for Elsie Caroline Binley of Southport, who was charged with theft of a number of articles, valued at less than \$50, the property of Ellis Bros. Ltd. She had her case adjourned by consent to Sept. 8 to fix a date for trial, with bail to stand.

ASSAULT CHARGE Aiden Joseph Doiron of North Ruston, charged with assault had his case adjourned by consent to Sept. 8 after evidence of Cst. Benjamin Gallant, Rustico police, who laid the charge and evidence from the accused who said he did not strike the constable. Cst. Gallant made the arrest at a party in North Ruston and said he was struck in the face by the accused when attempting to place him under arrest.

Counsel for the accused is Gordon Tweedy who is also acting for George J. Carson of Bonshaw, charged with an infraction of the Highway Traffic Act. This case was adjourned by consent to Sept. 8 to fix a date for trial.

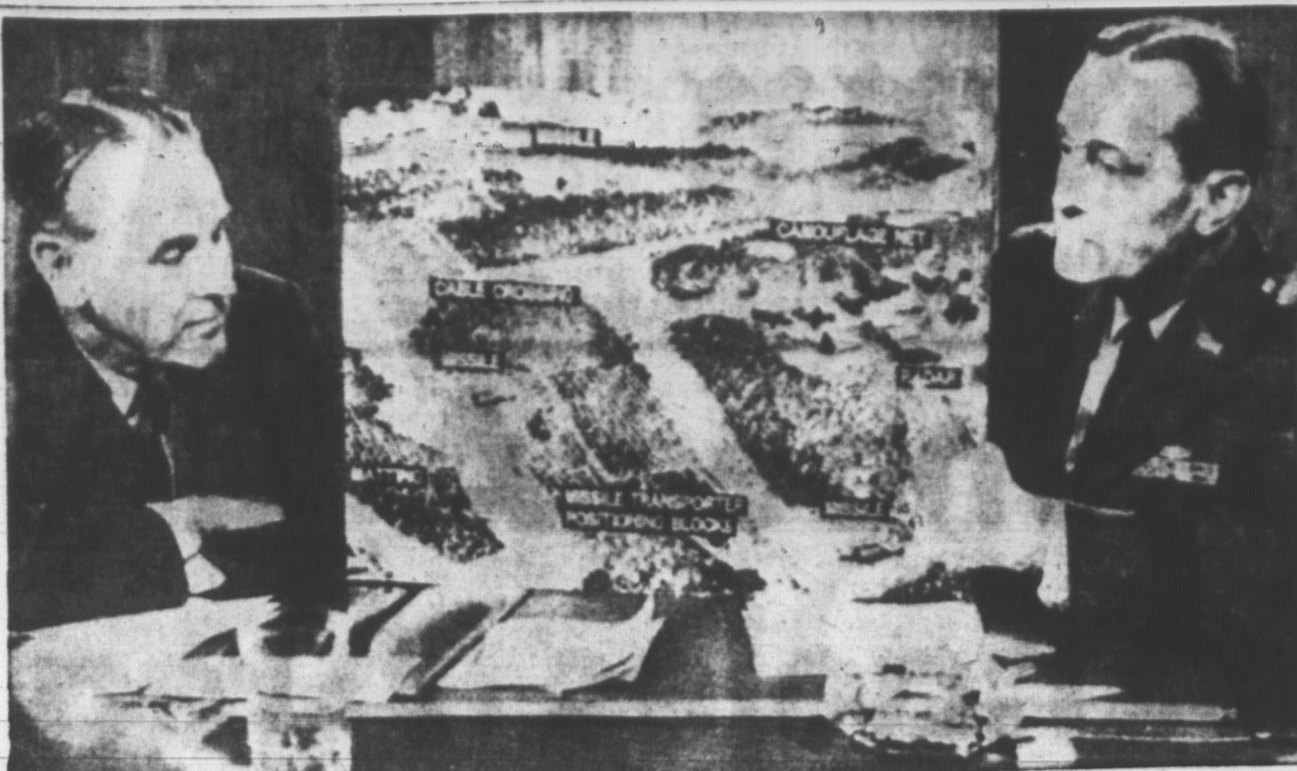

Disabled U.S. Dragger Gets Aid Off P.E.I.

ALBERTON — A large dragger was observed Saturday afternoon sailing in an apparently aimless manner about two miles off North Point at the Western end of P.E.I.

District protection officer, Norman MacLeod, who first noticed the vessel, went on board the patrol boat "Kildare Point" and went to the area where he found the 102-foot American dragger "Winthrop" in considerable difficulty.

Completely out of water for drinking or in the operation of its motors the dragger was miles off course owing to bad weather conditions. A break down had occurred in the radar and Loran navigation equipment, and a compass and badly in need of adjustment.

The crew of the Kildare Point received a warm welcome from the seven men on board the dragger which was escorted to the Fairway Bell Buoy off Alberton where Row and Upton Fraser volunteered the use of their lobster boat to haul water to the Winthrop.

Two tanks were obtained and 300 gallons of water were taken out and put on board of dragger which was loaded with 180,000 pounds of red fish.

The dragger was engaged in fishing off Newfoundland and normally would head for its home port of Portland, Maine, or Louisburg, N.S., to dispose of the catch. Too large to enter Tignish or Alberton the dragger hadn't sufficient water to reach Summerside when located by the fishery vessel.

After taking on board sufficient water the vessel set sail for Port Hawkesbury, N.S.

Lt.-Gen. Moncel Slated As Top Soldier In Army

By BEN WARD after a vacation at the seaside home he maintains on Murder Point, 50 miles west of Halifax, he discussed his new job in an interview Friday and emphasized the integrated approach to defence problems.

Educated at Bishop's College in Montreal, he joined the militia segment at the age of 16 and was commissioned two years later in 1937. At the outbreak of war in September, 1939, he enlisted in the active army as a lieutenant and went overseas shortly after with the Royal Canadian Regiment.

GOT FIRST COMMAND He was 25 when he got his first command, the 18th Manitoba Armored Car Regiment. Later he was shifted to headquarters staff of the 2nd Canadian Corps and went to France shortly after the D-Day invasion of June, 1944. Two months later, still only 27, he was promoted to brigadier in command of the 4th Canadian Armored Brigade and led it until the end of the war.

Gen. Moncel left the army briefly after the war but returned as a colonel in 1946 to become director of armor at headquarters here. Eight years and a variety of assignments later he was deputy chief of the general staff.

Gen. Moncel is married and has one daughter, Renee.

DETESTS LABEL The new vice-chief is popularly known as one of the "whiz kids" of the military establishment because of his sensational rise in the command structure but he thoroughly detests the label.

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Plans Are Made In Toronto To Publish New Magazine

TORONTO (CP) — Southern Press Ltd. and Toronto Star Ltd. have announced equal partnership in a new company to be a new weekly magazine, The Canadian, in the week ending Saturday, Nov. 13.

It will be a newspaper supplement with an announced circulation of more than 1,300,000 copies in the eight Southern newspapers in Ottawa, Hamilton, North Bay, Ont., Winnipeg, Medicine Hat, Alta., Edmonton, Calgary and Vancouver; and in Montreal Gazette, Toronto Star and Toronto Star Weekly.

The new magazine will absorb Canadian Weekly, now published by The Star. Southern's Canadian Homes magazine will appear as a separate section of mid-month issues of The Canadian, and also be distributed by London Free Press and Kitchener-Waterloo Record.

The Canadian will be a feature and picture magazine printed in rotogravure with color.

Publisher will be Ross Munro, 51, for the last six years publisher of Winnipeg Tribune, a Southern newspaper. His successor in Winnipeg as publisher and as a vice-president will be A. R. (Ron) Williams, also 51, assistant publisher of Southern's Vancouver Province since 1959.

Munro will be vice-president of the new Southern-Star company. Name of the company and names of its other officers will be announced later.

A graduate of University of Toronto in 1936, Munro was a renowned Canadian Press war correspondent from 1940 to 1945 and later served CP in Brussels and Ottawa before joining Southern News Services at Ot-

Spacemen Relax As Flight Nears

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Astronauts Gordon Cooper and Charles Conrad look their first day off in a long time Sunday and relaxed before plunging into final preparations for their eight-day orbital flight scheduled to start Thursday.

Today, Cooper, 38-year-old air force lieutenant colonel, and Conrad, 35-year-old navy lieutenant-commander, will be back in a simulated spacecraft at the Mission Control Centre here. They have done much of their training in this replica of the real thing, lying on their backs learning the hundreds of tasks they are to perform on the longest manned space flight yet planned.

Training emphasis has been on a critical rendezvous manoeuvre which the astronauts are to conduct during the first six hours of the flight.

During the second orbit, they are to launch their own satellite from an equipment section in the base of the Gemini 5 spacecraft. They are to back away from the 76-pound electronic package about 32 miles, then begin a game of "space chess" in an effort to close to within 20 feet of the satellite during the fourth orbit.

After circling the satellite, which they have dubbed the "little rascal," they are to move away from it and continue in their seemingly endless weightless whirl about the globe. They are to make 121 circuits.
