The Annual Rifle Competition will come off at the Rifle Range on Monday and Tuesday, the 19th and 20th inst.

A rowing match, for \$1,000 a side, has been arranged between the crew brothers, of New York, and St. John, N. B. The race to come off on Connecticut River, Springfield, on the 11th of September.

The telegraphic news of the past week is of an important character. The Emperor Napoleon has been visiting the Emperor of Austria at Vienna, and the latter is to return the visit. The latest despatches report that the King of Greece threatened to commence hostilities against Turkey on the 1st of September, unless the war of extermination waged against the Christians of Crete is stopped before that date. "Gold is advancing in the United States—its last quotation being 140 1/2."

That McGee will have a hard contest in Montreal is now apparent. The following, from the Montreal "Daily News," of Tuesday last, a warm supporter of Mr. McGee, will give the reader an idea of the strength of Mr. Devin:—

"A mass meeting, called by Mr. Devin, of his friends and supporters, held yesterday evening in Chabouzeau Square. We suppose there were from four to five thousand persons present; and they were most enthusiastic in their applause of Mr. Devin. The meeting broke up at about a late hour, that we would be unable to do justice to the eloquent speech delivered by the candidate, and to reserve it for the perusal of our readers to-morrow. We may say that Mr. Devin is seriously in earnest in his contest with Mr. McGee; and that this canvass is assuming, as far as we can see, formidable proportions. Mr. Devin has publicly asserted that only some twenty or twenty-five of his fellow-countrymen will vote against him, and that Mr. McGee cannot poll half-a-dozen French Canadian votes."

From last night's exchanges we perceive that the late gale has produced a full crop of disasters, both on sea and land, around the Provinces, a detailed account of which we will be able to lay before our readers next week.

By reference to our advertising columns, it will be seen that a grand Tea Demonstration, in aid of St. Andrew's Church, is to come off on the 14th inst. The Heather Belle will leave Pope's Wharf at 9 o'clock, a.m., for Mount St. Hart Bridge. From there the visitors will be conveyed to wagons on the grounds. Arrangements are being made for dancing, games, and other amusements peculiar to such occasions. As the object is a good one, as much pains will be taken for the accommodation of the town's folk, and as it is an excellent opportunity to enjoy a day's recreation, we trust that the Charlottetonians will be well represented on the occasion.

The steamer will also call at the usual stopping places up and down the river, both going and returning.

In shooting at Wimbledon on the Duke of Cambridge's prize with military breech-loaders, some 757 extraordinary scores for rapidity were made. Mr. Dunlop, of the London Scottish, made 75 points in three minutes, and it was believed by many who witnessed the trial of skill in rapid firing, that he would have made two shots more in the three minutes, but he was unable, in consequence of the great heat of the barrel, to hold his rifle longer. This score, however, was altogether eclipsed by Col. Halford, of Leicester-shire, who fired 23 shots in three minutes, with six bull's-eyes, 13 centers, and 4 outers, making altogether 71 points. He fired with a three minute rifle. Two other gentlemen fired 30 shots in three minutes with Remington and Westley Richards rifles, when 60 points were scored for the Remington and 48 for Westley Richards rifles.

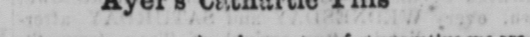
