# 21-Year-Old Dutch Skater Retains Skating Ch'ship

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (CP-AP)—Sjoukje Dijkstra, a 21-year-old Dutch girl, retained her women's world figure skating championship Sunday with a whirlwind freestyle performance that overwhelmed her opponents.

The other 23 competitors in the women's singles didn't have a chance this afternoon against the doctor's daughter from Amsterdam, who learned most of her skating on indoor English rinks mainly because the winter in her native Holland is too rough for practice.

But she skated as if she were behind. Her spectacular freestyle program filled with powerful jumps thrilled the 3,000 persons in the Olympic ice stadium in this North Italian resort.

She Dijkstra had an official score of 231.88 points and nine ordinis—indicating she was a unanimous choice of all nine judges for the title.

Miss Heizer finished with 225.25 points and 22 ordinis while the French girl had 219.01 points and 30 ordinis for third place.

Scores of the Canadians: Miss Griner, 217.29 points and 36 ordinis; Miss Burka, 216.43 and 31; and Miss Kenworthy, 189.06 and 161.

Miss Griner, 18-year-old holder of the North American title, was Canada's big hope for the title. She also was fourth entering Sunday's freestyle skating while Miss Burka, 16, was sixth and English-born Miss Kenworthy, 19, was 17th.

The Dutch girl's victory brought the 1985 world championships here to close, was a competition largely dominated by European competitors.

# Abbi Hoffman Sets Mark At K Of C Track Meet

CLEVELAND (CP-AP)—Abbi Hoffman of Toronto set a meet record in women's 800-yard dash in beating defending champion Sandra Knott of Cleveland Saturday night at the 29th annual Knights of Columbus track competition.

Abbi Hoffman, the only Canadian to place first, ran the distance in 2:14.3 to whip Miss Knott by 20 yards. The Cleveland girl held the previous record of 2:17.

Tom O'Hara, 30-year-old Chicagoan from Loyola of Chicago, shook off Poland's Witold Baran on the final lap and won the mile in four minutes, 5.5 seconds.

O'Hara dodged Baran's steps for more than one-half mile, began his sprint kick as the gun lap started and coasted home with a 10-yard lead.

Baran, like O'Hara, a sub-four-minute miler, was clocked in 4:06.4.

Stan Taylor of England finished third in 4:14.5 followed by Don Smith of Toronto in 4:23.4. A violent pile-up at the club house turned during the 15-mile race sent four horses and riders tumbling heavily to the dirt track. One horse, Dendado, had to be destroyed on the track.
