DIED AT SUMMERSIDE.—Mrs. Nisian Patterson, (mother of Mrs. Sidney Grey) died at Summerside yesterday, after a long illness. Her body was brought to Charlottetown today, and her funeral will take place from Mr. Grey's residence tomorrow afternoon.

A VALUABLE MINE.—The manganese mine at Dawson Settlement, Albert county, N. B., owned principally by New York parties, is to be worked on an extensive scale. A new blast furnace is to be put in and the company have contracted with S. L. Chapman, brick maker, at Brudenau's, to supply 50,000 bricks for the work.

SAILOR INJURED.—A Cape Breton sailor named McEachern, whilst going on board the scho. Mary B., late last night, fell into the vessel's hold and had his shoulder blade broken. He was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital this morning in an unconscious condition. The outcome of the accident is still in doubt. It is said that McEachern was under the influence of liquor at the time of the accident.

MUSICAL COMPOSITION.—The Times is in receipt of a piece of music written by Rev. S. J. Arseneault, C. S. C., the talented professor of music at St. Joseph's College. The composition is a march and two-step entitled "The American Big Four," and is dedicated to Messrs. W. McNamara, Thos. McLaughlin, J. Savage and F. Moran, former American students at the College. The production is pronounced by musical experts to be one of much merit and is likely to become popular, as it is arranged for band as well as piano.—Moncton Times.

MOUNT ALLISON INSTITUTIONS.—The Board of Regents of Mount Allison have concluded their session. It is announced that Principal Palmer has succeeded at last in getting the Academy on a sound paying basis. No changes are announced in the staff. The Ladies' College has had its most successful year financially as well as in point of attendance. The vacancies on the teaching staff caused by the resignation of Miss Fanning and Miss Fawcett have not yet been filled. Principal Borden, who leaves for England on the 5th may bring back a couple of teachers with him.

AGRICULTURAL PICNIC.—The parishioners of St. Teresa's will hold an agricultural picnic on the church grounds on Tuesday, 29th June. Mr. A. G. Gilbert, poultry manager of the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, will address the audience early in the afternoon, with special reference to the poultry industry. G. W. Forrest, of the Experimental Farm at Nappan, will also be present and speak on general farming. The picnic is in aid of the church fund, and nothing will be left undone that would be calculated to make the picnic a success. There will be tea and refreshment tables on the grounds.
