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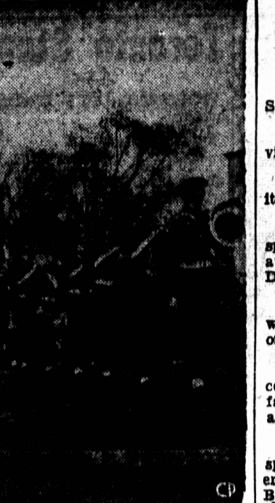

IN MEMORIAM

GEORGE A. DOUCETTE

In the passing on Friday evening, January 16th of George A. Doucette, Skinner's Pond suffered the loss of a good citizen, an able and intelligent leader, a fine gentleman and a man one would be proud to call "friend".

He was born sixty-nine years ago at Waterford, P.E.I., the son of the late John M. Doucette and Rebecca McKay Doucette. After finishing his education in the local schools he went to work with his father in his fish processing establishment at Waterford, and later through sheer ability rose to owner and operator of his own plant at Skinner's Pond. His life was truly a useful and industrious one as is testified by the comfortable home which he built and the productive acres surrounding it; this in addition to his canning establishment, the products of which were always a superior quality and found a ready market.

For the past several years due to ill-health Mr. Doucette was unable to take an active part in the actual work, but through the wise guidance and advice he gave his sons they continued to conduct the business in a brilliant manner.

His character, personality and methods of working were such that the men in his employ loved and respected him while those with whom he had business relations learned quickly to rely on his honesty and fairness. All who knew him and regarded him so warmly will surely miss him as does his family, so dear to him.

He was a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church and his zealous Christian manner will well be a model for all to follow who wish to lead an ideal Christian life. Ever ready and willing to help in community efforts and to encourage and assist those in trouble and need, his presence will be sorely missed and difficult to replace.

His wife, the former Eleanor Myers, and a son Fred predeceased him. Left to mourn his memory are six sons and four daughters: Roy and Wilfred on the home-stead; Walter, Gerald and Austin, Skinner's Pond; and Frederick, N.B.; (Eleanor) Mrs. Melvin Peters, Lachute, P.Q.; (Delores) Mrs. Patrick Black, Saint John, N.B.; (Evelyn) Mrs. Morris Yule, Mont-real, P. Q.; and (Noreen) Mrs. Donald Copeland, Lachute, P. Q.

The funeral, which was one of the largest in the vicinity for some time, was held from the residence to the St. Simon and St. Jude Church, Tignish, on Tuesday morning, January 20th, in requiem High Mass was sung by his pastor, Reverend J. A. MacDonald, assisted by the parish choir under the direction of Reverend Dennis Gallant. Services at the grave were conducted by Reverend J. H. Le-Gallant. Pallbearers were Joseph E.
