TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SHOOTING AFFRAY. MONTREAL, Jan. 14. Joseph J. Chandler, a Spaniard, employed as porter by the Canadian Pacific Railway, shot J. A. Sheffield, Superintendent of the Pullman and dining car service, this evening, in the latter's office, on Dalhousie Square.

Amendments to Election Act.

QUEBEC, Jan. 14. The Government's resolution, upon which a bill to amend the Controverted Elections Act is to be founded, will be introduced to-morrow. It gives the right of appeal only from judgments of election courts carrying personal disqualification.

The Mainland Mail Service.

OTTAWA, Jan. 14. The Charlottetown steamship men have submitted to the Government an offer to renew their contract for the mainland mail service for five years for a subsidy of \$4,000 per annum, instead of \$10,000, as at present.

Anarchists on the Move.

PARIS, Jan. 14. The Anarchists of this city have issued a manifesto to the electors of the department of Seine, in which they appeal to the people not to vote for any candidate.

The Order Countermanded.

CAIRO, Jan. 14. The Mahdi has countermanded the order to the Governor of Berber to leave with his army for the Upper Nile.

Appointed Administrator.

OTTAWA, Jan. 14. Chief Justice McDonald has been appointed Administrator of the Government of Nova Scotia during the absence of Governor McLellan.

A Duel.

PARIS, Jan. 14. A duel was fought to-day between Henri Rochefort, editor of L'Intransigent, and M. Lisagary, editor of La Bataille.

The Panama Canal.

PARIS, Jan. 14. The Senate to-day adopted twenty-four articles of the bankruptcy bill, which becomes law and will enable the Panama Canal Co. to judicially liquidate its obligations without declaring itself in bankruptcy.

Evangelical Alliance.

PURSUANT to notice, a meeting of persons interested in the Evangelical Alliance was held in the parlor of the Y. M. C. A. on Monday evening, Rev. James Carruthers in the chair.

It was moved by Rev. Mr. Crawford-Frost, seconded by Rev. J. Read, and unanimously adopted. That this meeting constitute itself a branch of the Evangelical Alliance for the Dominion of Canada, upon the basis of the constitution adopted by the Conference held at Montreal in October, 1888.

A code of bye-laws was then adopted, after which the following officers were elected:—President, Wm. Heard; Vice-Presidents, Messrs. H. J. Cundall, W. E. Dawson, and A. Kennedy. Vice-President for Prince County, Sheriff Strong; for King's County, Mr. John Goff, of Cardigan. Treasurer, Geo. Bremner. Secretary, T. C. James. Executive Committee, the officers of the Alliance, all clergymen who are members, and Messrs. F. W. Moore, John Ball, R. M. Barrett, Henry Smith, and Wm. Weeks. It was decided to hold a public meeting quarterly. The next business meeting is appointed for Monday, Jan. 28, to which all interested are cordially invited.
