RACES AND TEA AT GEORGETOWN.

The races at Georgetown on Tuesday the 24th inst., were witnessed by about 600 people, which, considering the busy season of harvest, was a fairly good attendance.

The races were called about 2 o'clock, p. m., the first being the three minute class in which there were four starters.

The first heat of the 3-minute class was a close race between Reyburn and Klondyke until shortly after the 1/2 mile was passed when Klondyke collided with Reyburn's sulky, throwing the latter off his feet.

The second heat was longer in getting started, and the judges warned the drivers against prolonged scoring, which had the desired effect, and the word was given on the sixth score.

In the third heat the most exciting contest was between Klondyke and All Right Jr., for third place, both horses doing well, but All Right Jr., proved too speedy for the son of Dean Swift.

A severe thunderstorm passed over O'Leary Sunday evening. A large barn belonging to Thomas Smallman was struck by lightning and burned with all its contents.

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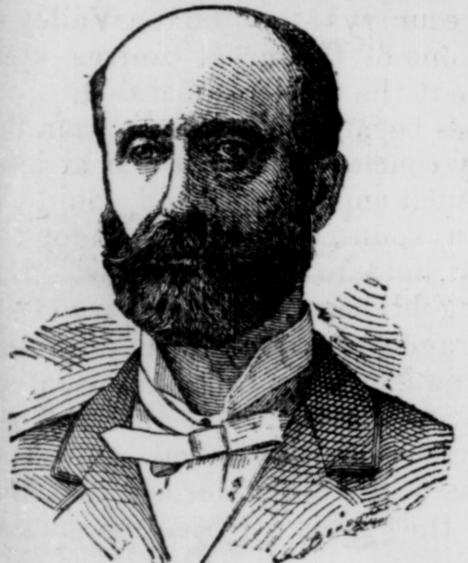
