

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

VIENNA, Sept. 25.

Riza Pasha seems to have shaken off his apathy and is concentrating at Gouca, and sending thither ammunition from Scutari, which looks as though he was preparing for all emergencies. This may have some effect on the population and the league.

GRAVOSA, Sept. 25.

Admiral Seymour will have to-day definitely instructed the Prince of Montenegro, who will order an advance on Dulcigno. All Foreign Consuls have been withdrawn from Scutari.

SETTINE, Sept. 25.

Admiral Seymour has returned to Gravosa with special delegates attached by Montenegro, to the Commander of the International Squadron.

SCUTARI, Sept. 26.

Austrian Consul recently invited the Albanian Chiefs at Dulcigno to come to Scutari in order that he might represent to them the necessity of the surrender of Dulcigno but the Chiefs felt more than ever determined to resist.

GRAVOSA, Sept. 26.

Ships which sailed to reconnoitre Albanian coast have returned to Ragusa. Albanians are flocking to Dulcigno in great numbers. Montenegrins will postpone hostilities until Turkish troops are withdrawn. Montenegrins are ready to engage the Albanians but do not wish to fight Turkish regulars. The departure of the International Squadron is said to be suspended in consequence of fresh negotiations started by Montenegro.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 26.

Count Von Hatzfeld, the German Ambassador, has had four hours interview with the Sultan and vainly tried to persuade him to consent to the peaceful surrender of Dulcigno. The Sultan replied in terms similar to those of the Porte's last note, refusing to order the surrender unless the Naval demonstration was abandoned.

Count Von Hatzfeld has invited the Diplomatic body to a meeting to discuss the situation occasioned by the above interview.

LONDON, Sept. 25.

Parnell is at present in England consulting eminent lawyers on the subject of the rumored Government prosecution of members of the Land League, but will reach Ireland in time to attend the land meeting at New Ross on Sunday. The agitators declare they will keep within the law.

DUBLIN, Sept. 26.

A telegram from Galway reports that Lord Mountmorris, a small land owner, who was on bad terms with his tenants had been found murdered near Ballarrobe. He had received six bullet wounds.

LONDON, Sept. 26.

Land meetings were held to-day at Kilrush and New Ross. Ten thousand persons were present at the former meeting. Parnell attended at the New Ross meeting, at which 20,000 were present. Parnell denounced the Liberal Government for following in the footsteps of its predecessor, and said that nothing but the abolition of landlordism would lead to a satisfactory settlement of the land question.

The Accrington Strike Committee, in conjunction with the Wages Committee, have resolved to advise the Accrington operatives to keep working a little longer in order to give employers a chance of carrying out their promise of an increase of wages. Delegates from North and East Lancashire met at Blackburn on Saturday and empowered the Wages Committee and Local Committee to deal with the dispute in any manner they thought best.

PARIS, Sept. 25.

Archbishop Guibert has published two long letters, the first addressed to DeFreycinet, on the 9th, and the second to President Grevy, on the 15th inst. The former protests in the name of liberty against the religious decrees, and points to many acts of charity performed by the Orders under his control. The second letter is similar in substance and tone.

PARIS, Sept. 26.

M. Raynal, member of Chamber of Deputies for Gironde, has accepted the order of Secretaryship of Public Works, and M. Horace Choiseul, the under Secretaryship of Foreign Affairs.

RAGUSA, Sept. 26.

The British despatch boat Hillicon, with Admiral Seymour and all the other commanders, except the French, on board, has gone to make a reconnaissance in Albanian waters.

MADRID, Sept. 25.

The Queen is progressing favorably. The King and Queen yesterday gave an audience to the Papal Nuncio, who presented in a marble and ebony casket the gift of the Pope to Infanta Mercedes. It is a satin robe, covered with lace, displaying the escutcheons of Spain and the Pope on the skirt. King Alfonso, by Royal order, commanded 25th September, to-day, the fete day of Santa Mercedes, to be kept as an official holiday and gala day in the palace in honor of the Infanta Maria Mercedes Isabella. This year, in consequence of the Queen's health, there will be no reception or banquet in the palace.

LONDON, Sept. 25.

The direct United States Cable Company gives notice that the tariff will be two shilling a word on and after the first of October.

UNITED STATES.]

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.

Several months ago it was discovered that a theft had been committed in the Treasury Department. A thorough investigation was ordered by the Secretary, but every effort was made to keep the theft a

secret, and it has been very difficult to learn the result of the investigation of the facts in the case, as now disclosed by a Treasury official, are as follows: During the war numerous articles taken from bodies of soldiers killed in battle were forwarded to the Second Auditor's office as the officer having the proper official charge of accounts and effects of the dead. These miscellaneous articles were from time to time, as they were received, deposited in a large safe standing in the chief clerk's room, and a memoranda taken thereof. As the great bulk of articles were taken from bodies of unknown soldiers, or gave no indication in themselves to disclose their ownership, they remained year after year unclaimed, and even their existence was unknown except to a few persons. Among other articles contained in the safe were \$6,000 worth of town bonds, but even the memorandum taken at the time they were deposited failed to state by whom they were placed there. During the administration of Auditor E. B. French (now dead), C. F. Herring, of Massachusetts, filled the position of chief clerk, and upon his death last winter it was for the first time discovered that the bonds were missing. The matter was placed in the hands of the chief detective of the Treasury, and a thorough investigation satisfied the secretary at the time that the bonds had been abstracted by Herring and doubtless negotiated.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.

Captain Howgate has ordered the *Galvare* (*Gulnare*) to return to Washington, and expects she will sail from St. John's, Nfld., to-morrow. The expedition has been abandoned for this season, but Captain Howgate proposes to repeat the experiment in the spring.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.

A London special says, "It is believed that Admiral Seymour's fleet will arrive before Dulcigno on Tuesday; that Montenegrins will be landed under the guns of the fleet, and take the town, but it is conjectured that the Albanians will fulfil their threat and burn the place."

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.

Major Walsh denies that Sitting Bull is to travel with him on exhibition.

The ship *Magdalen* arrived here has on board John Proctor and M. Conden, who were picked up at sea in a small boat. They belonged to the Gloucester fishing schooner *George Clark*, and drifted away while fishing.

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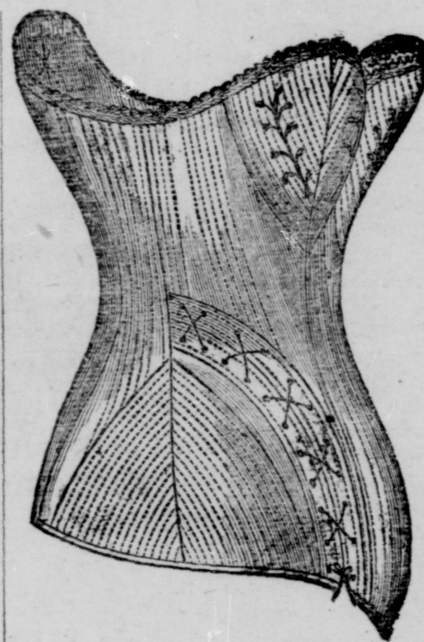
