Editorial Notes.

It is now reported as certain that an improved Extradition Treaty, to include Canada, will be concluded between Great Britain and the United States.

The duties collected in Charlottetown last year amount to over \$23,000 more than in the previous year; and from Montreal, Toronto, St. John and other cities come statements of increasing revenues in the waning of 1885.

A careful analysis of the present British parliament-elect shows that it will contain 112 barristers, 69 manufacturers, 42 merchants, 35 journalists, 25 bankers, 24 brewers, 23 civil servants, respectively of different professions, callings and that the number of members certainly aristocratic will not be over 46 all told.

While we are enjoying mild and spring-like weather, the people of England are experiencing severe cold and storms. A London despatch of Dec. 30 says: After three months of nearly incessant rain we have suddenly plunged into an almost hyperborean winter.

"Laclede," in the Montreal Gazette, notes a lovely incident of Mr. Gladstone's birthday in the presentation by his son Herbert, of a marble bust of Lord Beaconsfield, and remarks that two such men were fit to understand and appreciate each other.

The P. E. Island Patriot says that about 600,000 bushels of potatoes have been shipped to the States the past fall, and that about 400,000 more will follow in the spring, making a million bushels in all.

But, don't the people of the United States pay these duties on the potatoes they import. "The importer pays the duty, that is clear." The Patriot says so.

The Montreal Witness hopes that Canada will enter this year on a period of unexampled commercial prosperity, and that of a more solid sort than for a long time back.

New Publication.

Business Failures 1885. (Halifax Herald.)

According to the record of Messrs. Dan. Wiman & Co., the number of business failures and amount of liabilities in Canada for the year 1885, were as follows:

Compared with the previous eleven years, this is a most satisfactory showing. During 1884 the failures numbered 1,308, with liabilities amounting to \$18,939,770.

The annual average for the five years, 1875-9 inclusive, was 1,820 failures, with liabilities of \$26,460,000. For the six years, 1880-5 inclusive, the annual average has been 1,045 failures, with liabilities of \$11,000,000.

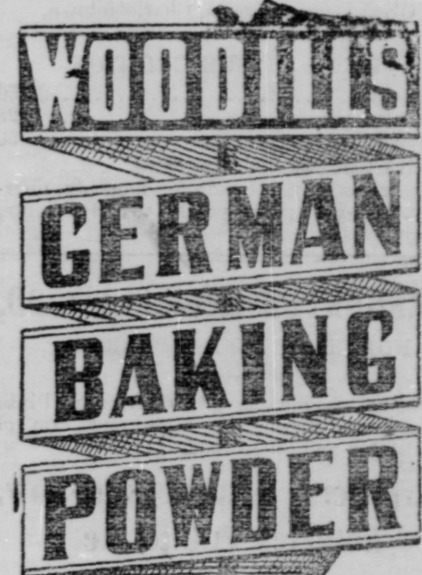
