Anglo-Iranian Co. Agrees To New Compensation

TEHRAN, Iran (Reuters) — The Anglo-Iranian Oil Company has agreed to accept less than one-third of the amount originally claimed as compensation for nationalization of its holdings in Iran, Finance Minister Ali Amini said Sunday. The agreement wipes out the last major issue in the dispute between Britain and Iran that began in 1951, when former premier Mohammed Mossadegh took over Anglo-Iranian's huge Abadan refinery. At the same time, it removes the final obstacle to a resumption of Iranian oil production under auspices of an eight-company international oil group. Iran will pay "less than \$30,000,000" in compensation, Amini told a press conference. He pointed out that Britain had originally asked \$300,000,000 and declared that his government regards the settlement as "a victory."

ABSORBS COUNTER CLAIM The settlement also takes into consideration a small refinery at Kermanshah, which the new National Iranian Oil Company will operate exclusively for domestic oil markets, and the losses suffered by Anglo-Iranian during three years of non-trading here. It absorbs an Iranian counter-claim for \$30,000,000 for losses sustained as a result of Britain's economic embargo during the long dispute. The compensation talks have been entirely separate from the negotiations conducted here between the government and the oil companies. The belief in diplomatic circles here is that if the Reds are planning aggression by using Pridi as a result, serious trouble may be a front, serious trouble may be the closer than many people think.

Rev. Alexander McDowell Inducted At Service Held At Elmsdale United Church

Rev. Alexander McDowell was inducted Friday evening as minister of Elmsdale, Montrose, Campbellton and Miminagash congregations of the United Church of Canada. The service, held in Elmsdale Church, was conducted by a delegation of the Rev. S. Edw. Ham of Margate conducted the worship and inducted the new minister. He was assisted by Rev. W. H. Forsythe of Springfield West who read the Scripture and led in prayer. Rev. Murray Gardner of Alberton gave the charge to minister and people and preached the sermon. The choir sang "Out Of My Bondage." Seated with their minister-elect were members of Session, Messrs. William McKendrick, Hudson Pridham, Frank Ye and Burton Stewart, and during the solemn service of induction they, on behalf of the pastoral charge, received Rev. Mr. McDowell as their minister and pledged themselves to "labour with him in faith and prayer for the honor of Christ and the comfort of His Church." In his charge to the minister Rev. Mr. Gardner reminded him that a good minister must proclaim God and share his own experience of Jesus Christ with his congregation. He must preach the gospel in terms of daily life, showing forth the majesty of God and the love of Jesus Christ, and direct the people, in all their experiences, to Him who is the source of all strength. He asked the people to remember that their minister has human limitations, as have other men, and that he must serve the whole church. Give him your confidence, the speaker continued, make him your friend; tell him if there is illness in your home, tell him your troubles. He has been trained to help you. He is your leader; be loyal to him and to your church. Pray for him and encourage him. Then you can face the future with eager, expectant minds. "This is a time to go forward with God." Rev. Mr. Gardner's sermon was based on 1 Peter 2:9 "Ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of Him who hath called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." Here is the distinctive mark of a Christian: He is one who has responded to the call of God and been set apart. The Christian must show forth God's salvation to his neighbors and friends. He will live in right relationship to God and his life will be characterized by purity of character, beauty and love. This text is an anchor for that they are Christians to people that they are God's own property and nothing can overwhelm them. The end for which we, as Christians, have been called and equipped is to yield ourselves to God anew and resolve to keep ourselves from selfishness and impurity. To such a life God calls us and to such a life we can attain by His promised blessing. Following the service the members of the Presbytery were entertained at the manse.

Canada Starts Crop Year With Record Carryover WINNIPEG, (CP)—Canada will start the 1954-55 crop year Aug. 1 with the greatest peace-time carryover of grain in her history. Officials said Saturday that estimated stocks of 794,500,000 bushels are much larger than the previous peace-time record carryover of 625,000,000 bushels held at Aug. 1, 1953. Only in the year of 1943 were carryover supplies larger than at present. At that time, they totaled 832,000,000 bushels, largely because of curtailed shipping. Some 570,000,000 bushels of wheat are stored on farms or in Canada's licensed elevators as the new crop year begins. Added to this are some 224,500,000 bushels of coarse grains. The coarse grain carryover consists of about 85,000,000 bushels of oats; 120,000,000 barley; 18,000,000 rye; and 1,500,000 flax. Present huge wheat stocks developed through the tremendous 1953 production and sharply reduced commercial disappearance. Canadian farmers harvested 614,000,000 bushels of wheat last year which was added to carryover stocks of 369,900,000 from the previous crop year.
