Trade Minister Howe, announcing to the Commons Wednesday that this is the last year for government backing of the trade fair, said "has not lived up to expectations as a medium for promotion of Canadian exports."

J. H. Ferguson (PC—Since North) said a large number of foreign industries have settled in Canada because of the fair. He asked whether the government would reconsider its decision if the Province of Ontario offered assistance.

DIAMOND JUBILEE Father Monaghan The 50th anniversary (Diamond Jubilee) of the ordination to the priesthood of Rev. Martin Monaghan, D.D., retired parish priest of Miscouche, was honored yesterday morning by the pupils and sisters of Marian Academy.

Father Monaghan celebrated High Mass in the Convent chapel at seven o'clock, which was attended by all the senior pupils of the school. The choir sang the Mass Cum Cubilo and at the offertory rendered the hymn Panis Angelicus by Diexic.

After Mass a reception was held in the music room at which an interesting program was carried out. Rev. J. D. Kelly, P.F., was present. The program opened with the playing of the march, Hungarian Dance by Mouskoski. This was played by Ann DesRoches and Dolores Gaudet, grade eight pupils; followed by the chorus, Haec Dies, by Legrace.

A beautiful hand painted spiritual bouquet was presented on behalf of the younger pupils by Carolyn Poirier, Claudette DesRoches, Louise Poirier, Fay Williams and Rose DesRoches. An address was then read by Della Gaudet of Grade 11 in which reference was made to all the work he had accomplished for the parish during the 40 years he was parish priest.

The address stated that the convent owned its survival to him.
