JOHN DREW, who acted as a sort of Prime Minister to King Cetewayo, demands either the occupation by the British of the intervening territory between Zululand and the Transvaal, or the return of arms to his people, or a guarantee in form of British protection against a Boer invasion. Sir Evelyn Wood is known to sympathise thoroughly with Dunn's views. Dunn believes that Boer invasion of Zululand is certain if the country be given back to the Boers. He believes the Boer leaders to be earnest in their wish for peace, but the Boers themselves are not controlled by their leaders.

VENOR publishes his predictions for July. He says it will give a great deal of rain over a large portion of the United States and Canada, while in Great Britain the weather will in all probability be likewise stormy and wet. The storms of wind, thunder and lightning are likely to be heavy and frequent between the 10th and 15th. An exceedingly hot term is likely to be experienced in both the United States and Canada within a few days from the close of the month. Probably about the 27th or 28th a cool wave will occur, carrying frosts in Canada and cool weather generally with storms of wind and rain throughout the United States.

EXTRACTING CONFESSIONS.—The following from the Law Times for May 28th, in reference to confessions extorted from prisoners, is worthy of note to magistrates, police and others: "In Reg vs Fennel, heard before Lord Coleridge and four other judges on the 21st May, it appeared that in the presence of a police inspector, the prisoner's employer said to him, 'I hear you have been making house-breaking instruments, you had better tell the truth, it may be better for you.' Then the prisoner made the confession given in evidence. He admitted making the tools. The inspector said 'you have stolen your master's steel to make them. And the prisoner said, 'Yes it was his iron I took.' The Court set aside the conviction. This is in accordance with the excellent principle laid down many years ago in Reg vs. Budkin, that when a constable arrests persons he ought not to ask questions.

Dominion Exhibition Notes.

The special attention of the agriculturalists and mechanics of this Province is directed to the advertisement of the Advisory Board, appointed by our Local Government to make arrangements for securing the best possible representation of our Island industries at the General Dominion Exhibition, to be held at Halifax, Nova Scotia, next September.

The Advisory Board, as will be seen by their advertisement, offer every facility to intending exhibitors from this Province, and we trust that no effort will be wanting on the part of our people to win a fair share of prizes in the different departments of live stock and agricultural products, and also in the industrial and mechanical departments of the great national exhibition which is to be held at a place so near to our own Province.

The Board of Managers of the Dominion Exhibition at Halifax should see that prize lists be freely distributed. No information of importance to exhibitors should be withheld. We trust that Mr. McKerron, the secretary at Halifax, will take this gentle hint and govern himself accordingly.

Supreme Court—Prince County.

The Supreme Court closed on Saturday last. The jury in the case of McLeod vs Gillis found a verdict for the plaintiff. The next case was James Beales vs Allan R. Spence, an action for a promissory note. The defence was that the note was altered after it was made without the defendant's consent or knowledge.

Verdict for the defendant. Davies, Sutherland & Weeks for plaintiff. Hodgson for defendant.

Robert C. McLeod v Edward E. Clark.—Action of damages for not delivering deals pursuant to agreement. Verdict for plaintiff \$110 damages. Hodgson & McLeod for plaintiff. Palmer for defendant.

Joseph Arseneux was sentenced to four months imprisonment for larceny. The Court then adjourned.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, June 24.

The British barque Try, from Cardiff for St. Stephen, N. B., was abandoned on the 14th in lon 41 W. The crew were rescued by the steamer Celtic Monarch, from New York for this port. The Celtic Monarch damaged her propeller in rendering assistance to the crew of the barque and was taken in tow on the 16th by the steamer St. Bernard and brought to Queenstown to-day.

The Times says: In April, 1879, the Henley stewards decided that the entry of any foreign crew must be made on or before 1st of March, and that each member of the crew must be certified by the British Consul, or chief authority, of the locality from which he comes to be a bona fide amateur. This law was published and commented upon in the English and New York sporting papers, so it is impossible for anybody to plead ignorance of its existence. We believe no objection has been made by competitors to the Cornell crew for the Steward's cup, but we understand that clubs engaged will summon the stewards to insist upon the production of the necessary certificates of qualifications of the Cornell men as amateurs, and that such certificates shall be duly lodged with the stewards, even if the latter choose to create an inconvenient precedent by breaking through their invariable practice of refusing past entries.
