

Glac Bay Outplays Islanders For 3-1 Victory Saturday Night

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP)—Glac Bay Miners defeated Charlottetown Islanders 3-1 in the Maritime Major Hockey League Saturday night and outplayed them by an even wider margin.

The win gave Miners a tighter hold on third place and pushed Islanders deeper into the league cellar.

Gordie Miller sparked Miners, scoring two of their markers. Bobby Brown scored the other. Norm Connolly was awarded an assist on all three goals. Orin Carver was the lone Charlottetown scorer.

Glac Bay scored in the first period and Charlottetown tied it up in the second. Miners fired two unanswered goals in the third.

Islanders were badly outshot. Goalie Roger Bessette handled 32 stops, while Miners' Cliff Hicks had only 12.

Referee George O'Donahue handed out four penalties, three of them to Islanders.

N.Y. Player In Hospital After Meleé On Ice

NEW YORK, (CP)—Ron Murphy, young New York leftwinger, was taken to St. Claire's hospital Sunday night with a possible concussion and fractured cheek bone following a wild skirmish which would have done justice to one of Madison Square Garden's best pro boxing bouts.

The fighting, which broke out late in the second period of the Rangers-Quebec game, resulted in match penalties to Murphy and Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion of Montreal. The infraction calls for an automatic \$100 fine.

Murphy and Boom Boom hauled off and duelled with their sticks following some minor skirmishes at Montreal's rink boards. The Canadian right wing then struck Murphy across the face with his stick and the latter fell to the ice in a heap. After he was administered to by the house physician, Ron left the ice with a cut cheekbone.

As Geoffrion moved toward the Canuck dressing room, he was jostled by a fan and he and other Montreal players, swung their sticks at the irate customer, and others sitting at the side arena.

Halifax goaltender Roy MacMeekin made a fine comeback Saturday night to shutout the Sydney Millionaires after he had suffered unmercifully at the hands of the Islanders on Friday night. The Islanders blasted nine goals past MacMeekin on Friday in the most impressive sharpshooting display seen here this season. Six of those goals came on penalties and that showing by the Island attackers left the impression that the Islanders have the strongest power play in the league.

Murph Chamberlain and Leo Lamoureux had a fine power play for the Islanders back in the first year that Charlottetown was in the Big Four. There was Bucko Trainor, Walter Pawlshyn and Bruno Favero with Frank Bathgate and the late Johnny Dutchak on the points. This quintet accounted for many an Islanders win when the opposition was short-handed. However, they never gave such impressive performances as the Robert, Saindon, Carver or Gray, Trainor and Whitlock combination of Friday night.

Those three goals while Wywrot sat in the penalty box during the first period were spectacular efforts. On the second and third goals Robert and Saindon had very small targets and they practically had to shoot the puck through the eye of an needle to score. Robert was again brilliant in the second period while the Islanders had a two man advantage as he set Carver up for two fine goals and Saindon for one.

The two demonstrations served as warnings for opposing players to keep clear of the penalty box if they hope to win games against the local team. Tonight, in the only game to be played here this week, the Islanders face the Miners and it will be interesting to see what the Miners can do to stop the local machine when they have a man doing time.

Islanders Executive Makes Appeal For Funds

The executives of the Islanders Hockey Club and Boosters Club held a meeting over the week-end and after discussing the financial condition of the Club the following letter was written by Islanders Club President Smith MacFarlane:

The Hockey and Boosters Club Executives met over the week-end to discuss the present financial condition of the club.

"It was felt that with the powerful team we have at the present time, and with a couple of possible additions that Halifax Coach Dugger McNeill wasn't exaggerating when he said we had a powerful team, and that the league was well balanced at the present time.

"We felt that our powerful team (remember Friday night) would have enough drawing power to attract houses such as we had Friday night, and if the fans respond like that the future operation of the team would be assured.

There are other entertainments in the planning stage, which will we feel, be able to make up any deficit should occur.

"That is the future, but to reach that future we have to weather the present, and to do that the Club must have \$2500 within the next two days, and the only possible way that can be obtained is by a personal canvass.

"We know it will be impossible to make a complete canvass in the next two days, so would urge every supporter to contact some member of either the Hockey or Boosters Executive, and give what you feel able, to help ensure that we have the winter sport we all love so much. Hockey fans it won't take much. If every fan at the game to-morrow night would give a dollar bill, that would solve the problem.

"Fans and supporters we are asking for \$2500 to save an investment of over \$7,000 in players and equipment, which would be lost if for any reason we fail to finish out the schedule.

"We do not like to make this appeal at the Christmas season, but if you fans, and there are over 1500, want Hockey the Club must have \$2500 immediately."

Proposes Fighter, Bases On Small Ice Islands

WASHINGTON, (AP)—A U.S. Air Force expert Sunday proposed forming small fighter plane units on polar ice islands which could lash out with atomic bombs against any aggressor nation.

Lt.-Col. Joseph O. Fletcher, who organized the first detachment for the drifting ice island T3 in 1950, said such units might prove to be the only readily available retaliatory bases if Russia should strike suddenly and wipe out present U. S. air bases in forward areas.

Fletcher, now in the air research and development command, outlined his proposal in a paper written for the official publication "Air University Quarterly."

"The basic unit might be built around the all-weather fighter as an atomic bomb delivery vehicle, supported by long-range air transport or by submarine," he wrote.

Game Of Wits

"Such a widely dispersed force would be at home anywhere in the Arctic Ocean, would possess unparalleled destructive capability, and would be relatively invulnerable to countermeasures. . . . Here, if anywhere, military competition will be a game of wits in which flexibility and versatility will win over brute force."

"Properly camouflaged, it could lurk within short distances from enemy shores without fear of detection. . . .

"There are no technical obstacles formidable enough to prevent the development of such a tactical

capacity. . . . While he did not so specify, it is known that small but powerful atomic bombs can be carried in such planes as the jet F-84 fighter.

Fletcher said that in any sudden atomic war Russia would strike first and possibly destroy such forward bases as the big airbase at Thule, in northwest Greenland.

Moreover, he suggested that use of bases in foreign territory might be lost by shifting policy of friendly nations.

"In some cases our allies, faced with the choice of neutrality or obliteration, may decide that neutrality is their only salvation," he said. "Already we hear talk from some of them."

Fletcher also said that the submarine will become an important weapon in the Arctic.

"To the submarine the pack ice which restricts its access to the surface, also offers protection from detection and attack from the air."

U. S. Will Join In Security Offer To U.S.S.R.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The United States is prepared to join Britain and France in offering security guarantees to Russia—provided these are part of a package solution of the problems of German unification and a German peace treaty.

The precise way in which the security assurances might be given is one of the subjects set for discussion among representatives of the three Western powers. They now are meeting in Paris to prepare joint positions for the proposed four-power session in Berlin that would include Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov.

Officials here said the Paris meeting is concerned not only with the security question—on which Prime Minister Winston Churchill spoke to Parliament Thursday—but also and much more importantly, with the development of a set of proposals for German unity and peace which the Russians will be challenged to accept. One informant said the U. S. government feels that the Western powers must have a "positive approach" to the Berlin meeting.

The West has proposed that the meeting begin Jan. 4. The Soviet government has not yet said whether that date is acceptable.

Churchill Has Hand Burned

LONDON, (Reuters)—Sir Winston Churchill's left hand, ignited by a box of matches lit by his cigar, was dressed at Chartwell, his home in Kent, by a local doctor Sunday.

A member of the Prime Minister's household said he was "quite well" and not unduly hampered by the bandaged hand. It was burned while he was attending a luncheon Friday.

Churchill drove to Chequers, his official country home in Buckinghamshire, with Lady Churchill later Sunday for a family Christmas dinner.

The Christmas dinner party will include eight grandchildren, as well as Mr. and Mrs. Randolph Churchill, Supply Minister and Mrs. Duncan Sandys, Mr. and Mrs. Christopher Soames and Sarah Churchill Beauchamp, who is flying from the United States to be with her parents.

Canadians Buy Two-Year-Olds At Newmarket

LONDON, (CP)—Canadian purchases at the Newmarket December sales included the smart two-year-old St. Vincent, it was learned Friday. The colt will be flown to California next week.

St. Vincent, by Ocean Swell out of Light of Day, was purchased for 5,100 guineas by the Anglo-Irish Agency on behalf of George Gardiner of Toronto. The two-year-old won three good races in England this year, including the Prince of Wales Nursery at Doncaster, one of the few mile races for two-year-olds.

An announcement from the Anglo-Irish Agency also said the two-year-old Correck has been acquired in Ireland for P. D. Gordon of Vancouver, Correck, which finished second recently in a big field in Ireland, will be shipped to Canada shortly.

The Anglo-Irish Agency is the company which recently sent a large shipment of thoroughbreds to the United States on behalf of Alberta Ranches, a turf syndicate controlled by trainer Vance Longden and three Calgary business men, Max Bell, Frank McMahon and Wilder Ripley. The shipment included Blue Butterfly, now in training at Santa Anita for the 90-day meeting opening Dec. 6.

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Islanders Out To Chase Glac Bay Hoodoo Tonight Tiger MacKie To Play

Don Peniston's Glac Bay Miners, the club whom many hockey observers pick as the team to beat for M.M.H.L. honors, return to the Forum tonight for a game with the Islanders and a renewal of the battle for third place.

The two clubs opened a three game series in Glac Bay Saturday night with the Miners taking the opener 3-1 despite the brilliance of Roger Bessette's goal tending. They play again on Wednesday night before a five-day lay-off for Christmas.

The Miners have been little short of brilliant in their games against the Charlottetown Club. They hold an impressive edge over Bucko Trainor's improving squad but the Islanders coach figures the point has been reached where the tide commences turning the other way.

The fortunes of the Islanders have taken an upward swing since the arrival of former Quebec Leaguer Claude Robert. The left winger, turned centreman gave his most impressive performance here on Friday night when he sparked the Islanders to a 9-4 victory over Halifax.

That was the night the Trainormen displayed a potent power attack to score six goals while the Atlantics were short-handed. It was a warning signal that any club wishing to beat the Islanders from here on in will have to stay clear of the penalty box.

Irving Tiger MacKie, the Southport product, who has been playing in New Glasgow in recent years will lineup with the Islanders tonight. MacKie, is a hockey veteran dating back to the days of the Junior Abbies in 1934 when he played with the only Charlottetown Junior team that ever played in the

Memorial Cup finals. Since then he has played in professional and amateur leagues throughout the U.S.A. and Canada. He is coming back to his home town tonight to help the Islanders three man defense staff for one game.

Meanwhile Trainor has been in touch with another outstanding defenseman apart from Dutch Saindon. This player is attempting to procure his release from a club and play with the Islanders. Trainor may have definite word on him today.

The Islanders will be playing without Bob Gray tonight who has been sidelined for a week or more with a heavy cold.

The lower price rate will still be in effect. The club received quite a shot in the arm Friday night when an almost capacity crowd turned out to see the Halifax-Islanders game.

Nfld. Experiences Severe Blizzard

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., (CP)—Winter's first blizzard tore across eastern Newfoundland early Sunday. Wind gusts to 80 miles an hour piled two and three-foot snow drifts on highways leading into St. John's, stalling motorists and disrupting bus schedules.

The temperature dipped to a frigid 12 degrees, coating ponds and rivers with the first ice of the season.
