EVIDENCE GIVEN

Hearing Opens In June Death Of Ernest Brown

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN - The preliminary hearing of John Angus MacKenzie, Brae, charged with criminal negligence in the death of Ernest Brown, Piusville, on the night of June 19, 1958, when the motor vehicle the accused was driving is alleged to have run into Brown at Bloomfield Corner causing fatal injuries, was commenced in Magistrate R.S. Hinton's Court, Summerside last evening. Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C. presided.

J. Watson MacNaught is defence counsel and Mr. D.O. Stewart is Crown Prosecutor. Albert Saunders, Bloomfield, was first witness called and told the court he operated a service station at Bloomfield Corner. On the night in question, he stated, he heard the MacKenzie vehicle go by his garage and looking out a window saw the car shortly after it left the highway.

He ran down across the road into a field according to his testimony, and saw a man standing beside the car. He said he later found out the man by the car was MacKenzie. Mr. Saunders said he attempted to talk to the man but he didn't answer as he appeared to be in a dazed condition. He said he stopped a car driven by a Mr. MacKenna and MacKenna found the body of Brown about 15 feet from the front of the MacKenzie vehicle.

Asked by defence counsel if he had been asked at the coroners inquest if he smelled any liquor on MacKenzie's breath he answered, "I don't know what my answer was but if I were asked that question I would say, no I didn't."

MAN IN FIELD Dr. L.G. Dewar described how he was summoned to the accident about 1 o'clock and on arrival noticed one man on his knees in the field. He said he found out it was MacKenzie and later went over to him and found him lying on his face. He was told by one of the group at the scene that there was a badly injured man near the car, so he stated he went over and found the man dead.

Dr. Dewar said he came back to MacKenzie and told Mr. Saunders to call an ambulance. The ambulance came and took MacKenzie to hospital where he was treated by Dr. Dewar for cuts and bruises to the face.

On cross examination Dr. Dewar said when he found MacKenzie he appeared to be "knocked out" in the unresponsive state and he was still in this state at nine o'clock the next morning.

Dr. Dewar said this unresponsive state could be caused by several things, such as being stunned in the accident, but added he didn't care to suggest anything else from a medical standpoint.

CAR AWAY Gerald Yeo, 16, O'Leary told the court that he and Ian Strang also of O'Leary went down to the home of Clifford Seaman, O'Leary after supper on the evening of June 19th to see if they could get the car to go to Alberton to a dance. However, he stated, the car was away.

The witness said Jack MacKenzie drove up as he, Ian Strang, Clifford Seaman, and Hazen Silliker were standing in front of the telephone office. MacKenzie asked for a light and

received it. The boys, according to Yeo, asked him to take them to Alberton and MacKenzie replied he had no gas. The group offered to buy the gas and the accused agreed to drive them to Alberton, witness said.

Yeo, stated, Ian Strang drove the MacKenzie car while the accused got in the back. The witness stated that MacKenzie was "in bad condition - no state to drive." He added he could smell liquor from his breath also. After a couple of brief stops on the way to Alberton for various reasons, Yeo said they went to within about one mile of Elmsdale when MacKenzie decided his wife might be worried about him and told the group he would have to go back home.

ASKED TO DRIVE He asked to drive and took over the wheel from Strang. He reportedly drove for a short distance (nearly a mile according to later evidence) and then decided to turn the car around. However, in so doing he nearly backed in the ditch and stopped the car cross wise on the high-

way. Yeo wasn't sure if MacKenzie completed the turn or if Strang had done so. Evidence by Strang later revealed he had taken over from MacKenzie to drive the car around.

Hazen Silliker, 15, and Clifford Seaman, substantially corroborated Yeo's evidence. However, the evidence given by Strang at last night's hearing didn't agree in several cases with information he had given to the RCMP in a statement he gave them and signed two days after the accident.

Pathologist Dr. John Craig told of performing the post mortem on Brown's body and said he found a number of severe injuries, any one of which could probably have caused death. These were the severing of the right leg, very severe abdominal wound, fracture at base of skull.

He said the wounds were caused by "very violent contact." Dr. Craig also told of the amount of alcohol in the victim's body.

The hearing was adjourned until Friday, October 3rd.
