

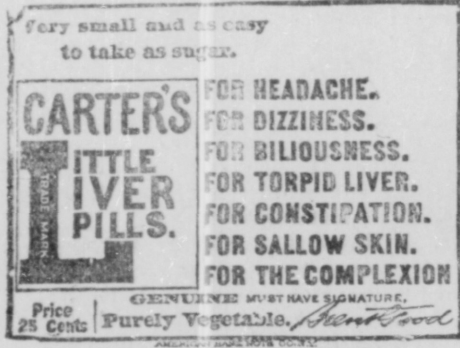

CONSISTENT TEMPERANCE MEN!

DEAR SIR,—In the Guardian's report of
the annual meeting of the Provincial Alliance
recently held in Charlottetown—Mr. S. M. Martin,
Grand Chief Templar of the Grand Lodge of I. O. G. T., is credited
with saying "that he was opposed to license
in every form—he didn't care
from whom or where it came," and "if
the Liberal party is to become a license
party they would have our support less
than they have now." Consistency, thou
art a jewel. Mr. Martin's attitude on the
temperance question can only be com-
pared to that of a certain "Independent"
editor not many thousand miles from
Charlottetown, who is temperance when it
suits, but Grit all the time. Wasn't the
Liberal party a License party on the 13th
of December last when Mr. Martin voted
for them? Didn't D. A. McKinnon promise
the Guardian that he would do all he
could for temperance? But when the
vote was taken on the License Act didn't
he leave the room and refrain from voting?
Still after all this the Grand Chief Templar,
Mr. Martin, declared at a public meeting
during the last election campaign that he
admired the stand taken by Mr. McKinnon
on the temperance question. Consistent
Samuel, whether are you true to the Grit
party or to the cause of temperance?
When this Chief says "our support" does
he mean the I. O. G. T. vote? And if
the License Act is not repealed will he
ask them to vote against Farquharson?
Not much fear. But if he will get a
nomination he would gladly contest the
Murray Harbor district to support Farqu-
harson and his License. There are some
Liberals who are so belovably wedded to
party that no divorce law can separate
them. They have swallowed Farquhar-
son's red-eyed license-pill without a cough
of disapproval. They have rolled under
their tongues as a sweet morsel the Lau-
rier plebiscite farce. Now at a wink from
Mr. Farquharson, when he is about to
make a change in the Act to try and catch
the temperance vote, these party first
men become roaring lions against it. The
Guardian some two years ago was making
a big mouth about the Scrimgeour ware-
house and the License Act. There was no
election near then, but now that an elec-
tion is at hand the Guardian is gagged
and devotes all his energies to writing
against the Tories. Men of this stamp
who make use of temperance for party
purposes are the worst enemies the cause
can have.

Oh, for consistent temperance men who
would practise what they preach. They
would make politicians tremble in their
boots if they knew that every temperance
man was sincere. I detest men who preach
temperance and vote for license.

The British in India.

Prof Goldwin Smith had a letter in one
of the New York papers a few days ago
replying to an article censuring British
rule in India. In his short letter Prof.
Smith said that he felt sure that an im-
partial survey will lead to the conclusion
that for the last century the spirit of British
government in India has been benefi-
cent, and that the administration has been
on the whole very able and remarkably
pure. Its one fatal and incurable vice is,
he thinks, that it is the government of the
stranger. He said:—"I have had occasion
for historical purposes to study the
history of British India, and I think I
have studied it impartially. I am myself a
believer not in empire but in a community
of nations, self-developed, contributing
each of them its own gifts to the human
store and aiding each other by example
and emulation in the race of progress.
My fealty is to England not to the Em-
pire."

The object of the letter is to point out to
the Imperialists of the United States the
probability that their government of the
Philippines cannot be as successful as
British government in India, because it
will scarcely be possible that in the latter
case the influence of home politics can be
shut out as in the British administration
of India. It is this feature of British
rule in India that makes it approach suc-
cess.
