

Defending-Champ Lema Takes British Open Lead

SOUTHPORT, England (CP) Defending-champion Tony Lema of the United States needed only 29 putts to fashion a sparkling five-under-par 68 Wednesday that gave him a one-stroke lead at the end of the first round of the British Open golf championship.

The cocky and casual Lema, known as Champagne Tony on the pro circuit because of his taste for the bubbly, fired six birdies in his sizzling round that set a course record for the reconstructed Royal Birkdale links in this English seaside town.

Ireland's Christy O'Connor was breathing down Lema's back with a 69, but the favorite, Jack Nicklaus, trailed by five strokes with a par 73. Nicklaus, the U.S. Masters champion, had a miserable time with his drives.

veteran who has been one of the leading amateurs since the Second World War. Then came Bruce Devlin, the tough Australian, with a 71.

Lema, Palmer and Nicklaus were the only U.S. players in a contingent of eight to break or equal par among the 22 players who did it. Fourteen players among the 130 starters smashed par while eight equalled it.

Nine players, most of them from the United Kingdom, also were in the running with 72s. They were Englishmen Lionel Platts, Brian Bamford, Guy Wolstenholme, Doug Sewell and R. M. Mandeville; Scotmen Eric Brown and J. McAllister; Ireland's Christy Green and Sebastian Migual of Spain.

NICKLAUS AT 73 Bracketted with Nicklaus at 73 were Welsh stars Dave Thomas and Brian Huggett, Englishmen Peter Allis, Hugh Boyle Neil Coles and J. A. Macdonald and Doug Beattie of Scotland.

Another 18 holes will be played today with the top 45

players and ties going into the final 36 holes Friday.

The 210-pound Nicklaus sprayed his drives and found the greens bumpy on the wind-swept 7,037-yard seaside links, but he was far better off than Gary Player of South Africa, the U.S. Open champion, who slipped to a 76 after taking a two-over-par seven on the 15th hole when he bunkered his shot.

SNEAD LAGS Sammy Snead, the 33-year-old slammer who won the title in 1946, shot a creditable 74. Altogether 17 players finished with 74s. They included Kel Nagle of Australia, loser in a playoff to Player for the U.S. Open title two weeks ago; Peter Thomson of Australia, four-time winner of the British Open; another former champion, Max Faulkner of Britain; and Roberto De Vincenzo of Argentina, a frequent

challenger but never a winner. Americans Phil Rodgers and Terry Dill each shot 75s while another American pro, Doug Sanders, came in with a 78 after a four-over-par nine on the 10th hole.

While the course had hidden dangers for most of the field, it failed to confuse Lema who hit his irons magnificently and putted like a magician.

The suave Californian, who won the title last year at St. Andrews, Scotland, had seven one-putt greens and three-putted none.

Another American, Arnold Palmer, two-time winner of the British Open, stayed in contention with a 70, sharing third place with Joe Carr, the Irish

National League Shatters Custom

CINCINNATI (AP) — Gene Mauch, National League All-Star manager, departed from custom Wednesday and passed over three "second choices" as he picked nine players for the 1965 All-Star team.

The annual game between the All-Star teams of the National and American leagues will be played at Minnesota July 13. The starting line-ups, except for pitchers, were picked by a vote of players.

To augment the starters, Mauch, manager of Philadelphia Phils, picked catcher John Edwards of Cincinnati Reds; infielders Ed Kranepool of New York Mets, Cookie Rojas of the Phils, Leo Cardenas of the Reds and Ron Santo of Chicago Cubs; and outfielders John Callison of the Phils, Roberto Clemente of Pittsburgh Pirates, Frank Robinson of the Reds and Billy Williams of the Cubs.

Generally in the past, the All-Star managers have picked players who finished second in the balloting for starting positions.

This year, however, Mauch passed over first baseman

and outfielder Vada Pinson of the Reds. Manager's choice: Kranepool, Rojas, Clemente and Robinson were picked over those three.

The selections left only the world champion St. Louis Cardinals and Houston Astros without a representative. Under All-Star game rules every club must be represented by at least one player so at least one of the pitchers from each of those clubs will have to be named when the hurlers are selected Friday.

The starters will be Joe Torre of Milwaukee, catcher; Ernie Banks of Chicago, first base; Pete Rose of Cincinnati, second base; Maury Wills of Los Angeles, shortstop; Richie Allen of Philadelphia, third base; Willie Stargell of Pittsburgh, left field; Willie Mays of San Francisco, centre field and Henry Aaron of Milwaukee, right field.

Earlier, Mauch named managers Dick Sisler of Cincinnati and Bobby Bragan of Milwaukee as coaches.

Baseball Loop Looks Similar

Approximately this time twenty-five years ago the American Baseball League reached the traditional mid-point of the 1940 baseball season with the New York Yankees and its other teams in remarkably similar circumstances to those of the present.

And the stage was being set for one of the most thrilling stretch drives in major league history. The Yankees were in fourth place and were 6½ games behind first-place Cleveland, and only three games over .500 with a 34-31 won-lost record.

They had entered the season as overwhelming favorites to win a fifth straight pennant—something no team had done. Unexpectedly they had fallen flat at the start, and had tumbled into last place while losing eight straight home games early in May.

Injuries, an all inclusive batting slump and inconsistent work by established pitchers contributed to the collapse.

Through late May and June, the Yankees moved up and each threatening gesture was accompanied by cries of "look out, here they come."

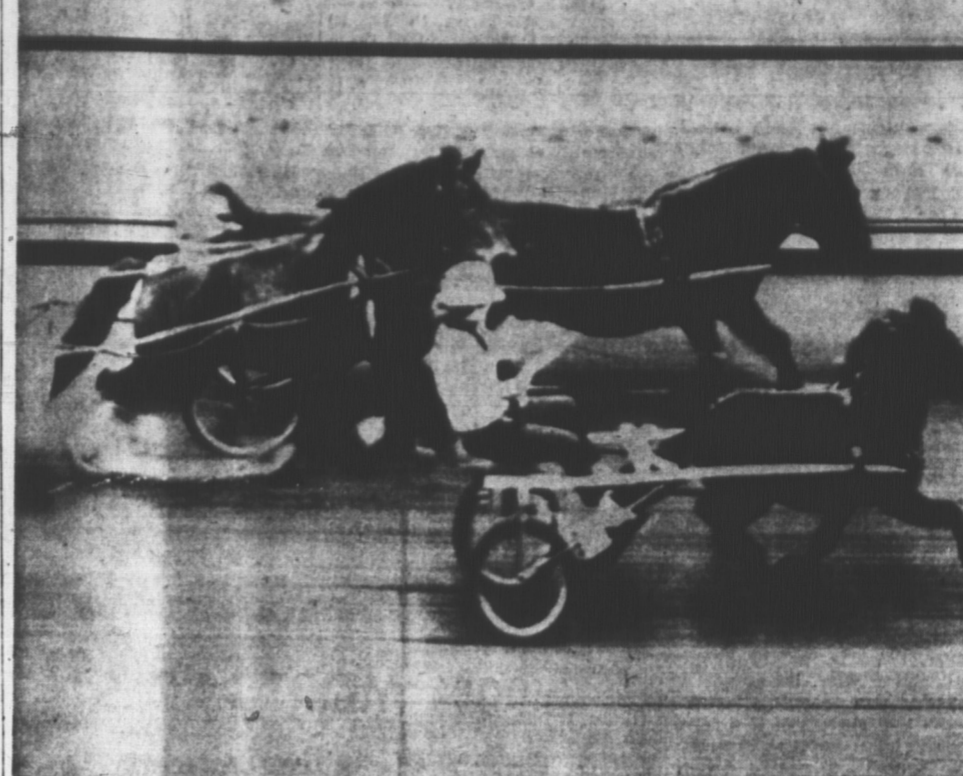
Each time, the team stumbled again before making really significant headway.

Today's Yankees are seeking a record sixth straight pennant and further points of similarity don't need repeating.

What happened to the Yanks in 1940? In the final standings, the Yankees were third, two games out. The road had been their undoing, they had not been able to win five pennants in a row. The achievement was left for Casey Stengel's Yankees of 1949-53 and for the current team to match.

But it was hardly as many wrote, "the end of the Yankee dynasty." It was merely an interruption. The next year the Yanks won the pennant by 17 games, then next year by nine and the following year by 13.

Since 1940, in fact the Yankees have won 18 of the 24 American League pennant races. But they did lose in 1940 while producing one of their most exciting seasons. It's entirely possible that a similar August and September are in store for 1965.

SUMMERSIDE — An exactor of \$233.60 on the final dash of the night climaxed the eight-dash racing program at the program at the track here last night.

There were only two ticket holders, one from the Charlottetown area and the other a Summerside area man, on the lucky combination of Bobby Gallon and Hallie J. (I. Neill).

The winner of the race, Bobby Gallon, driven by G. Sobey and owned by E.S. Waite of Summerside, also took a mark of 2:18.4 in capturing this event.

Two accidents came close to marring the program, seen by over 800 racing enthusiasts.

The first came in the fourth race when Amy Thorpe, owned by Bill Boyds of Charlottetown and driven by Buddy Campbell, fell as she was making a bid for victory.

The three-year-old roan filly, one of the top favorites in the race, suffered a cut on the neck but the driver was uninjured.

Winnie Jay Clegg, the 8-year-old brown chestnut mare owned by C.J. Stewart of Mt. Pleasant, received only minor injuries to her legs when she fell in the sixth dash of the night and Mr. Stewart, who was up in the sulky, escaped injury.

Eloise Wick, the four-year-old pride of the Greenbrier Farm of Charlottetown, stepped the fastest mile of the night in her first appearance in the early closer for 4-year-olds.

The bay mare, reined by Dave Wisener, did the twice around the oval in the third race in 2:09.4. She was also one of three double dash winners, doing the twice around the oval the second time in 2:11.4.

The other double dash winners were Topway and Norah Annway. Winning single dashes were Highland Spirit, and Bobby Gallon.

Other combination pays on the program were a \$7.90 quinella on Highland Spirit and Mister Annway in the fourth and a double of \$8.30 on dashes 1 and 2. The second double on races 6 and 7 paid a mere \$4.30.

Nine Dash Card At Ch'town Park

Harness racing at the Charlottetown track continues this evening with a nine dash racing card scheduled to begin at 8:00. A special attraction of the card will be the ponies of the P.E.I. Pony Association which have been trained to trot and which will stage a race between dashes. All children under the age of 12 will be admitted free of charge if accompanied by their parents or by a guardian.
