The chances of the World's Fair management getting clear of the financial woods are growing brighter.

THE SILVER DOLLARS

Are Down Again to 77 1-2

NEW YORK, June 27.

Silver certificates have dropped to 77 1/2; commercial bars silver to 77, and Mexican dollars to 60 cents. The break is due to cables from London reporting suspension of purchases of silver for Indian accounts and closing of the Indian mint. The belief that the Sherman silver bill will be repealed adds to the "bearish" feeling on the metal.

Another Brutal Murder.

Equals Jack the Ripper.

LONDON, June 27.

The crimes of Jack the Ripper are again called to mind by the murder of a woman of the unfortunate class at Rotherhoe, a suburb of London. The body was terribly gashed, but not mutilated in the disgusting manner that characterized the crimes of Jack the Ripper. It is thought that the murderer was frightened off by the sound of approaching footsteps before he had time to mutilate it.

A Missionary Cruiser.

St. John's, Nfld., June 17.

The ship Albert belonging to the English mission to deep sea fishermen, arrived here. She will cruise along Labrador in the summer months, affording religious and medical assistance. She has three doctors on board, two for the hospitals built on the coast and two trained nurses to assist them.

Strike at St. John.

St. John, June 27.

The ship laborers at work on all vessels in the harbor struck yesterday. The reason was that Stevedore Gregory did not pay over to his men some hundreds of dollars due on certain contracts. Alex. Gibson appeared on the scene last evening and arranged to pay Gregory's men. Operatives will go to work to-day.

TORONTO, June 27.

There is talk amongst Liberals here of inviting Hon. Edward Blake to stump Ontario for Laurier and the grid party. They intimate their desire to pit his influence against the selfish voters of Ontario who might feel inclined to support Sir John Thompson.
