

# Yanks In First Place Cards Defeat Dodgers

The New York Yankees and St. Louis Cardinals are showing the way in the majors after a wild Sunday when hitters fattened their batting averages and the Yanks' 10-game winning streak finally was broken.

Paul Lappine came to the rescue of Dick Donovan after a three-run homer by Mickey Mantle in the ninth inning of the second game at Yankee Stadium where the season's largest crowd, 63,787 including Prime Minister Kishi of Japan, saw the Yanks split a pair with the White Sox.

Chicago finally saved that second game for Donovan 4-3 after Bobby Shantz pitched the Yanks to a 9-2 victory in the first game. As a result of the day's action, New York still led Chicago by a half game.

St. Louis' National League margin remains one full game but a new team is second. Philadelphia, second Saturday night, dropped to fourth while losing two games.

Wally Moon drove in two runs with a triple and stole home in St. Louis' 4-3 margin over Brooklyn. It was Larry Jackson's ninth

victory although he needed ninth-inning aid from Hoyt Wilhelm. Milwaukee moved into second place by taking two from the Phillies 7-6 and 7-3. Hank Aaron's ninth-inning single won the first game and Billy Bruton drove in three runs with a triple and double in the second. Milwaukee's Joe Adcock broke his ankle in the second game and will be lost for several weeks.

George Crowe hit one homer in each game as Cincinnati singled five home runs in a sweep over Pittsburgh 5-3 and 5-2. The big first baseman had four hits in the first and two in the second.

The New York Giants won their fourth straight series by taking two from the Chicago Cubs 7-5 and 5-1, disposing of the Cubs' two promising youngsters, Dick Drott and Moe Drabowsky. Johnny Antonelli and Curt Barclay were the Giant winners.

Cleveland turned on the power, to hand Washington pitchers for a total of 31 hits in winning two games 14-2 and 7-5. The Indians' 19-hit total in the opener was their highest of the year as Early Wynn coasted to his ninth victory.

Frank Malzone and Ted Williams paced the Boston Red Sox to 10-6 and 10-1 romps over Kansas City. Malzone collected five of Boston's total of 31 hits including a two-run homer and a two-run double. Williams hit his 18th and 19th homers and also came through with a double and single to make his average .363.

Jim Busby's homer in the fifth inning gave Baltimore a 5-4 edge over Detroit in the only single game in the American League. Ray Moore retired 11 of the last 12 men he faced. The pitcher and Busby each had three hits.

Mantle had quite a day before the big crowd at the stadium. After collecting a double and three singles in the first game, he rapped Donovan for a single and his 21st homer to finish the day with .392, an increase of 13 points.

Donovan was a victim of sloppy fielding in the ninth when it seemed the Yanks were to be shut out for the first time this season. An infield single and an easy pop fly fell between left fielder Minnie Minoso and shortstop Sam E. Sposito preceded Mantle's blast into the third deck in right field.

## CAHA Will Give Closer Study To Classification

HALIFAX (CP)—The Maritime Amateur Hockey Association will give closer study to classification of senior leagues under its jurisdiction before drawing up playoff schedules.

The classification issue was one of the most contentious problems before the MAHA's 34th annual meeting here Saturday.

Bart Yerra, of Sussex, N.B., was elected president to succeed E. W. Connelly of Sydney. Other officers are first vice-president, Fred Fox, Lunenburg, N.S.; second vice-president Pius Callaghan, Charlottetown; third vice-president Steve McDonald, Sydney. Hanson T. Dowell, Middleton, N.S., was re-elected secretary-treasurer and registrar.

Criticism of playoff classifications was raised by Charles Donovan, president of Sydney Millionaires Hockey Club. Donovan said leagues and clubs with a high import quotas provided too strong competition for clubs stressing homebrews. The Cape Breton League champion Millionaires were ousted by the power-packed Bathurst Papermakers in the Maritime Senior B finals last season.

**CLOSER SCRUTINY**  
The MAHA executive decided it would give rosters and early season performances closer scrutiny before drawing up playoff arrangements. Officials said playoffs may be arranged so that representatives of a high-quota import

league would be sent against the Quebec province Senior B champions.

The association suspended for one year Dalhousie Ranger goal-keeper William Byers for what termed "an unwarranted attack" last season on referee Dewar Judson of Moncton.

The association granted permission to the Nova Scotia Armed Forces League to allow its teams up to five replacements per season. League officials said drafts and postings have weakened clubs in the past. Each club had been allowed only one replacement previously. A request by the same league for a bye into the Maritime finals was turned down.

**FIVE CHOSEN**  
Five players were chosen at the request of the CAHA as the Maritime portion of a pool from which six players will be chosen to strengthen the Allan Cup champion Whittby Dunlops for the world hockey tournament.

Maritime players referred to the pool are Frank Dorrington of Truro; Sherman White, Amherst; Hugh Campbell, Sydney; Sam Gregor, Sussex, N.B.; and Doug McPhee, Halifax.

Proposed for further study by the meeting was a separate minor hockey association to work under the jurisdiction of the MAHA but devoting itself exclusively to matters affecting divisions up to and including juvenile.
