(Received over Pittfield and Co's Private Wire) NEW YORK, July 30—This morning again business reports provide favorable news. Not only do corporate reports again show marked improvement over last year but Dow Jones reports heavy wholesale buying throughout the nation, the exception that steel production through the month of August should hold at a figure near the present rate of capacity and that the output of electricity against last week, was 14.5 per cent above the similar week of 1935. Labor news was brighter this morning with an agreement being reached yesterday between workers group of the C. I. O. and a wire company in Illinois. Bethlehem Steel dividend meeting is scheduled for 3 p. m. this afternoon. The technical correction in the market yesterday may carry through late in today's trading but we do not expect any severe setback in prices at this time. We still feel that stocks mentioned previously will do better.

Graded egg shipments in carlots or less were quoted at 28 to 29 cents a dozen for A large, 26 to 27 for A medium, 21 1-2 to 22 for B and 20 to 21 for C. Cheese averaged 13 to 13 3-8 cents for Ontario white and colored and 12 5-8 to 7-8 for Quebec white and colored. Quebec no 2 potatoes sold at \$1.40 to \$1.45 per 80 pound bag.

EXCHANGE

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Currencies

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, July 30—Leading European currencies continued to retreat in terms of the United States dollar today. The franc closed .00 3-8 of a cent lower, Holland guilders were off 1/16 of a cent, and Swiss francs suffered a like drop. The pound sterling advanced along with the gold units, ending 7-16 of a cent below Wednesday's finals. The Spanish peseta yielded .01 of a cent. A further decline of 12 1-2 of a cent in Hong Kong dollars featured early eastern rates. Canadian funds were off 1-32 at 99 31-32.

GRAIN

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, July 30—Dollar wheat was marked up for the first time in nearly a year on Winnipeg grain markets today as wheat futures prices climbed to new seasonal highs for the second successive day in a session of erratic fluctuations. Complete lack of prairie moisture and strength in outside markets influenced the advance. Values closed 3 7-8 to 1 3-8 cents higher, with July at 102, October 99 3-4 to 7-8 and December 95 5-8 to 3-4 cents a bushel. The July position reached a new high of 1.02, rising at that point, while October also touched the three-figure level but slipped fractionally at the finish. In cash wheat, demand for the higher grades of red springs, no 1 hard and no 1 northern in particular, was evidenced with spreads ranging from one cent better on the top grade to 1-4 better on no. 4 northern United States mills demanded the durums and spreads near the close were as much as 1 1-2 cents better, but offerings were scarce. Pit trade in coarse grains showed values generally making substantial gains, with the high points touched near mid-session. Most buying appeared of an investment nature, while offerings were largely profit-taking.

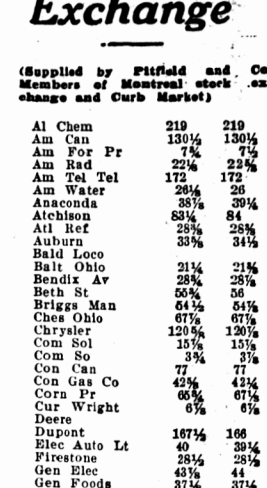

Canada's First Engine and World's Largest Streamliner Featured at Railway Centenary



Railway Pioneers' Hopes far Exceeded

Speaking at the recent centenary celebration at St. Johns, Quebec, the southern terminus of the Champlain and St. Lawrence, the first line in the Dominion, S. J. Hungerford, president of the Canadian National Railways, outlined the tremendous strides that had been made in railroading since he entered the railway business 50 years ago. "I can say in all truth that which has been accomplished has transcended the vision of the pioneers," Mr. Hungerford said. "Those who planned the Champlain and St. Lawrence and brought it into being no matter how optimistic they might have been, could hardly have foreseen what a mighty instrument of national welfare the railway was to be in Canada. The railway has been, and is the mightiest single force in the welding together of Canada and in the preservation of it as a nation. It is a mighty servant of the people. When this railway was conceived there was likewise brought into being that chain of circumstances which led to the formation of the Canadian National Railways, with its services to every province of the Dominion. It is the aim of the Canadian National Railways, the largest railway system on the North American continent, still to be in the vanguard of progress; to be a worthy instrument in the development of this great nation."

Recovery On New York Market

(Associated Press Financial Writer) (A.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 30—The stock market sat up today and took a little recovery nourishment. While the list continued to cope with profit-taking in many departments, an early rally in yesterday's heavy steels and others brightened the horizon for bullish forces and several of the aviation, alcohol, amusement, rail and specialty issues were singled out for buying attention. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks came back .2 of a point to 69.2. Transfers totalled 1,512,930 shares against 1,947,880 yesterday. Improvement in the steels was attributed to further study of the United States steel report and the general conclusion it was much better than indicated at first glance. After the close Bethlehem released its recovery quarter statement, disclosing the best net for any period, with one exception, since 1930. Aviation stocks came into the limelight following reports of larger foreign airplane orders. The rails were at their best in the final few minutes of trading.

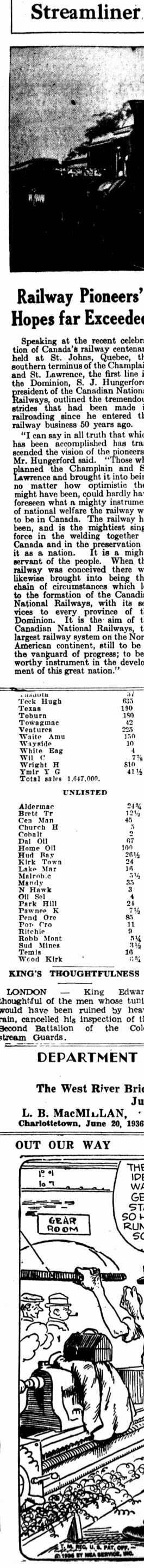
