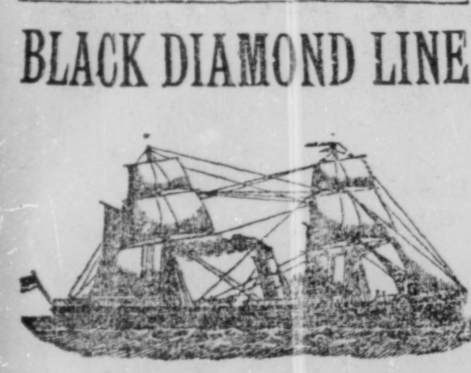

### LETTER FROM ST. MICHAELS

The Hattie F. Phillips a Swift Sailor  
—Lots of Gold.

A letter has just been received from Mr. Clement L. Pelly, of the Gloucester Mining Company, now in St. Michaels, Alaska. It will be remembered that this company left Gloucester, Mass., on the 17th Oct., last, for the Yukon River. Mr. Pelly writes: "We left San Francisco on the 13th May and arrived in St. Michaels the 11th June being only 30 days out. We met with a lot of drift ice while in the Behring Sea and were off St. Michaels three days before we got in. We were the first to get there this spring. The people there did not see a ship since the 25th of October last. "Our ship the Hattie G. Phillips proved herself to be remarkably swift boat, making the whole trip from Gloucester to St. Michaels in 152 days. "There are lots of mosquitoes here although there is snow on the ground. The weather is clear and fine here at present. "We sent the schooner back to California with 25 passengers and the mails. All of the passengers claim to have a large amount of gold." It is the intention of this company to proceed down the Yukon River in their large steam launches, and dredge in unexplored rivers. They will stay in the gold region two years.

### TONS OF LITERATURE.

TORONTO, Aug. 2.—The reports from Ottawa respecting the plebiscite vote have given renewed impetus to the leaders of the prohibition forces. The vast amount of literature, several tons in weight, consisting of nearly eight million pages of telling prohibition argument previously printed had been so nearly exhausted by Saturday that the Secretary of the Alliance, Mr F S Spence, found it necessary to order an additional amount of six hundred and forty thousand pages. Such a distribution of temperance literature is believed to have exceeded that of any other campaign anywhere. The Alliance campaign leaflets printed amount to 1,250,000 of four page tracts, a total of 7,960,000 pages. The committee feels that the educational result, by the convincing of the doubtful and conversion of those who were previously opposed to prohibition, will be demonstrated when the votes are counted.
