**Household Hints.**

For pimples and eruptions, dilute corrosive sublimate with oil of almonds. A few days' application will suffice.

One pint of bran, a handful of hops, some twigs of spruce, hemlock or cedar, a little sassafras, roots of burdock, plantain, dock and dandelion, boiled and strained, and a teaspoonful of ginger molasses, and a cupful of yeast added, will make a gallon of Good Templar beer.

When you have selected your egg-plants, cut off the ends; cut transversely in slices one inch thick; cook without grease or any other thing whatsoever, on a hot griddle or frying-pan; when cooked through and nicely browned, dress with butter and salt, and serve hot—piping hot.

If you wish to correct a stooping gait, have prepared a "crown," or band of iron—to rest around the head, but not on it—of a weight that can be worn without discomfort, but will compel the wearer to walk erect and with care. Practice daily in a long hall, and throw the shoulders well back.

When your straw hat needs bleaching, first scrub it well in water, softened with borax, using very little soap; then rinse it in borax water, using a teaspoonful of powdered borax to a basin of water; bleach it in the sun for two or three days; if the hat is very yellow, a little lemon juice rubbed on will prove effective.

Relief from Catarrh.—Inhale the smoke from pine-tar; get a pint or more of pure pine-tar (not the oil) from the ship-chandler; heat a poker red hot, and stir the tar with it; a thick smoke will rise; hold your head over it, keep your mouth shut, and inhale through the nostrils; heat the poker three or four times, until the room is filled with smoke, shut doors and windows, remain in the room as long as possible. In two weeks get fresh tar. It is a good plan to smoke in one's bedroom just before retiring; after smoking, open a window from the top; the smoke slowly escapes, but enough remains to be of some benefit.

Johnny Cake.—Two cupfuls of Indian meal, two cupfuls of flour, one-half cupful sugar, one tablespoonful melted butter, two teaspoonful cream tartar, one teaspoonful soda, two eggs, enough milk to make a stiff batter; bake in a quick oven about twenty minutes.

Grape Jelly.—Place the grapes in a jar, and the jar in a kettle of water; let them boil until they are all crushed; strain through a stout cloth; if ripe grapes, add one pound of white sugar to every pound of juice; if green, add one pound and a half of sugar, boil the juice just twenty minutes, and have the sugar heating in the oven; stir often to keep it from burning; when the juice has boiled the proper time add the hot sugar; when the sugar has dissolved let the syrup boil up once, remove at once from the fire; have your glasses rolled in hot water, and pour in the scalding liquor; when cold lay brandied paper on top of the jelly; tie or paste stout paper over the top of the glass.

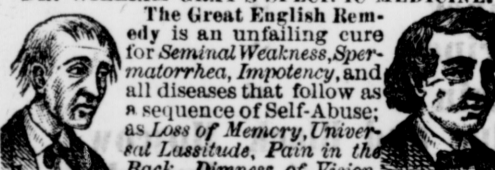

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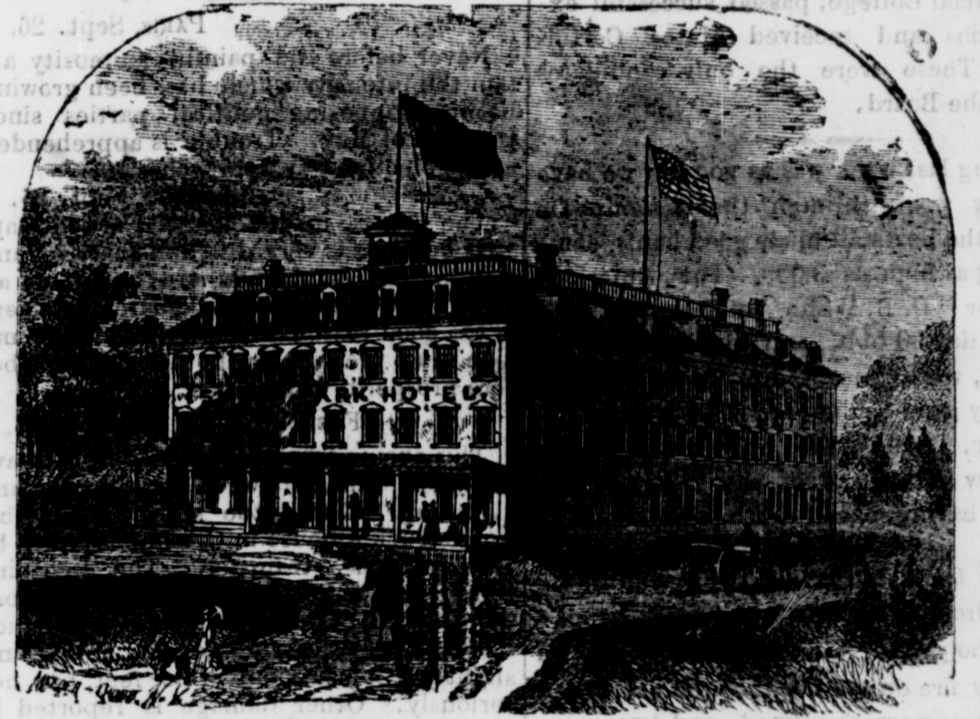
