## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### "Disinterested" Again.

SIR,—Your correspondent "Breder," who fondly imagines he is the possessor of a concise style, appears to treat with utter contempt the opinion of a Kentucky breeder like Dr. Babcock, because he does not come up to his idea of conciseness. This assumed air of contempt for the opinion of Kentucky breeders will impress no one who knows anything of the history of the breeding of the trotting horse for the last hundred years. The P. E. Island "Breder" who, in the "exuberance" of his vanity, thinks Kentucky can teach him nothing is not likely to make much progress in a study that is becoming "interesting" to him. It appears that one of the great factors in breeding is conciseness, a quality in which Dr. Babcock appears to be sadly lacking. The Duke of Marlborough came to America a few months ago and bought seven or eight head of young trotting stock. These he bought from the famous Woodburn farm of A. J. Alexander, Kentucky. In a recent number of the Fortnightly Review he describes the high position Kentucky holds in breeding the trotter. I know that "Breder" will entertain nothing but contempt for the Duke's judgment, when he learns that the English nobleman's purchase of stock was sired by a horse which bears the odium of being a "stable beauty with a number," with no record, a class of horses particularly obnoxious to our Island "Breder." When "Breder" fully digests the tabular statements which I may possibly give him something more to help him on in his studies.

### Life of the Future.

As an answer to one of the questions concerning the future life, recently propounded by correspondents of THE EXAMINER, an esteemed contributor furnishes the following extract from a sermon by the Rev. Malcolm MacColl, M. A., Canon of Ripon, etc.:

In matter of fact, God condemns no one to endless torment. He inflicts no arbitrary punishment on anyone. "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." God will have all men to be saved, and to come to a knowledge of His truth. You must not believe that God is keeping anyone in a place of torment against that person's will. "The kingdom of heaven," said our Lord on one occasion, "is within you." The kingdom of hell is also within the sinner's own breast in the anarchy and tormenting appetites of a ruined constitution. Man are not punished arbitrarily in the spiritual world for what they have done here, but for what they continue to do there, as the inevitable consequence of the habits formed in this world. Pain does not assail the drunkard to-day as an arbitrary infliction apart from the excess of yesterday; it is the excess of yesterday continued in its results, and impelling him to a repetition of the cause of his misery.

Death makes no breach in the continuity of human character. Man carries with him into the spiritual realm precisely that character which he bore in this life. He that is unjust let him be unjust still, and he that is filthy let him be filthy still, and he that is righteous let him be righteous still, and he that is holy let him be holy still." The punishment of the lost is no arbitrary infliction from without, but a torment springing from within; from raging animal appetites or fiendish passions, which devour the wretched creatures who have become their impotent slaves. So long as sin remains in man's nature he must of necessity be miserable, for he cherishes in his bosom the scorpion from which comes his pain. God strives to root sin out of our nature, because He knows that pardon is otherwise useless. God loves us, and there is nothing so inexorable as love when it is genuine. There is no weakness in it. It will inflict present anguish to save from future misery. As gold is put into the furnace to separate the dross from the pure ore, so God flings men into the furnace of affliction, that He may separate the sin that He hates from the soul which He loves. That is why he is called in the Old and New Testament "a consuming fire." Fire does not destroy, does not annihilate; it disintegrates, separates substances which are foreign to each other. God pursues us with the fire of His love, seeking to melt and mould us into conformity with His will, because that is the only way in which He can make us happy.

A late number of the Joliette, Ill., News says: Rev. Edward Whitman gave a reception to the young people of his congregation at his residence last evening. Sunday morning in the First Baptist Church, Rev. Mr. Whitman preached his second anniversary sermon as pastor. His review of the year was listened to with the deepest interest, by a large congregation and showed the church to be in a most healthy and prosperous condition. The Sunday school enrolls almost three hundred scholars, the temperance band includes an attendance of one hundred and thirty, and the missionary circle enroll a large number. Total additions to the church during the year were forty-five.

### Attempted to Kill the Czar

THE WOULD BE ASSASSIN IN WAITING AT THE GRAND DUKE'S PALACE.

The London Telegraph's correspondent at St. Petersburg says that an attempt was made on the Czar's life on Monday, but the attempt was cleverly frustrated. Monday was a Russian holiday, and according to custom the Czar and Czarina were to review the Imperial Guards at their quarters opposite the place of the Grand Duke Nicholas. Invitations to the ceremony had been sent to an extremely select and limited number of persons. A person in waiting was requested to remove his coat. He retired to an ante-room. He was immediately arrested and taken to prison, when a revolver and globe, supposed to contain poison were found in his pockets. His name is Shhamikin. He declares that the globe simply contains medicine. The police affect to have known of a plot connecting with Gungersberg's conspiracies and say they were watching for an assassin.

### Where Riches Are a Blessing.

We are too prone to measure a woman's worth by her condition in life. Only last week I saw the wife of a well-known New York millionaire enter one of the great hospitals of the town. After a bit, curiosity tempted me to follow, and for two hours I watched that woman going through the wards of the sick, dispensing here some dainty from a maid's basket, there a smile, and again a cheery word. All the patients knew her, and in a dozen instances did I see the stricken sufferers kiss her unglazed hand in gratitude, and close their eyes as a silent little prayer went up for this woman who, so bountifully blessed herself, did not forget that there were others less fortunate. And this is not an exceptional case, but one which you can see in the hospitals and institutions of the great cities of our land almost every day. Many a millionaire's wife is to-day sustaining the hands of the noble band of women who are striving to bring sunny spots in the lives of our working girls. Of course, there are women of vast worldly means who live within themselves, regardless of the want which exists at their very doors. But because such women—fewer than the average woman believe—unfortunately exist, it is unfair to judge all rich women alike. Because the church has within its doors people who would be better were they on the outside, is no criterion by which to judge the thousands of God-sainted men and women who are benedictions to the world at large. HOW THE MUSKRAT BREATHES UNDER ICE.—Animals that breathe by means of lungs can prolong their stay under water only through special anatomical arrangements, or by having recourse to some extraneous means. Mr. W. Spoon, of the Elisha Mitchell Society, who has hunted the muskrat in winter, asserts that the animal, when obliged to traverse, under ice, a pond so wide that it cannot keep up its breathing, stops from time to time and exhales the air from its lungs. This air, being confined by the ice, becomes oxygenated in contact with the water, and the animal, taking a fresh inspiration, dives in order to begin its swimming again a little further along. It appears that other observers have found that if this air is dispersed through the ice being struck, the animal is killed through asphyxia.
